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Meeting Minutes November 15, 2018

Call to Order:

Dr. Karen Salmon called the meeting of the Interagency Commission on School Construction to order at 9:19 a.m.

II. 21st Century School Buildings Program

A. 21st Century School Buildings Plan Process

Gary McGuigan, Senior Vice President, Capital Project Development Group, Maryland Stadium Authority, Eric Johnson, Vice President, Capital Projects Development Group, Maryland Stadium Authority, and Cynthia Hahn, Assistant Attorney General for the Maryland Stadium authority explained to the Commission the relationship between the MSA and the IAC in the 21st Century School Buildings Plan Process. An MOU governs the roles and responsibilities of the four partners in this process: the MSA, Baltimore City Public Schools, Baltimore City Government, and the Interagency Commission on School Construction. The IAC's role in the program differs from its role in the Capital Improvement Program. In the 21st Century School Buildings program, the IAC reviews and comments on various plans; monitors adherence to utilization rate targets; considers progress toward maintenance performance metrics; and approves Enhanced Approval Packages (EAPs), which include the feasibility study, educational specifications, and preliminary conceptual and schematic design elements for 21st Century School Building projects.

Secretary Churchill expressed an interest in understanding MSA's use of the Computerized Maintenance Management System. Ms. Lawlah asked for a clarification of the Patterson High School EAP, which was presented for approval, but deferred, at the October 9, 2018 IAC meeting. Mr. Gorrell explained that because the Patterson High School EAP had been approved by the IAC in 2016, the MSA has authority to modify the budget and schedule as needed to address the environmental remediation required at the site. Mr. Johnson clarified that a study of Patterson was done by an independent consultant who found that the EPA site has been contained. The project includes measures such as a vapor mitigation system, reworking of uncapped site areas, and the stripping and replacement of the top foot of soil in areas that will be left exposed.

Dr. Salmon and Director Gorrell introduced representatives of Baltimore City who were present at the meeting and commended them for the amount and quality of work they're doing to improve Baltimore City schools' facilities.

B. EAP - #237 Highlandtown Elementary/Middle School

Fred Mason, Chief, School Facilities Branch, Maryland State Department of Education, referred IAC members to a chart behind (labeled Item II. B). providing comparable information for each EAP considered for approval.

Upon a motion by Mr. Schuler with a second by Mr. Gibbons, the IAC voted unanimously to approve Highlandtown Elementary/Middle School #237 as a 10-year plan (21st Century Buildings Program) project and to approve the Enhanced Approval Package in accordance with the MOU so that the project may proceed into design as an addition project to increase the capacity of the school from 536 students to 914 students in grades Pre-K through 8 with an addition area of up to 35,140 gross square feet.

C. EAP - #27 Commodore John Rodgers Elementary/Middle School

Upon a motion by Mr. Gibbons, with a second by Secretary Churchill, the IAC voted unanimously to approve Commodore John Rodgers Elementary/Middle School #27 as a 10-year plan (21st Century Building

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Program) project and to approve the Enhanced Approval Package in accordance with the MOU so that the project may proceed into design as an addition project to increase the capacity of the school from 619 students to 1,044 students in grades Pre-K through 8 with an addition area of up to 49,084 gross square feet.

D. EAP - #144 James Mosher Elementary School

Upon a motion by Mr. Gibbons with a second by Mr. Schuler, the IAC voted unanimously to approve James Mosher Elementary School #144 as a 10-year plan (21st Century Building Program) project and to approve the Enhanced Approval Package in accordance with the MOU so that the project may proceed into design as a renovation and addition project with a projected capacity of 435 students in grades Pre-k through 2 with demolition of 5,000 gross square feet, renovation of 64,252 gross square feet, and addition of 17,000 gross square feet.

E. EAP - #142 Robert Coleman Elementary School

Upon a motion by Mr. Gibbons, with a second by Mr. Schuler, the IAC voted unanimously to approve Robert Coleman Elementary School #142 as a 10-year plan (21st Century Building Program) project and to approve the Enhanced Approval Package in accordance with the MOU so that the project may proceed into design as a renovation and addition project with an unchanged capacity of 314 students in grades Pre-K through 5 with renovation of the existing 45,819 gross square feet building and small additions to improve the entry sequence and community access.

F. EAP - #242 Northwood Elementary School

Dr. Salmon noted that a condition had been added to the motion. Director Gorrell explained that IAC staff needs additional information about the population at Northwood, to account for decreasing utilization at the facility. The condition moves the project forward but requires an overall look at schools in the area to ensure 90% utilization.

Upon a motion by Mr. Gibbons with a second by Ms. Avara, the IAC voted unanimously to approve Northwood Elementary School #242 as a 10-year plan (21st Century Building Program) project and to approve the Enhanced Approval Package in accordance with the MOU so that the project may proceed into design as a replacement project with a proposed State rated capacity of 704 students in grades Pre-K through 5 with an area of 98,091 gross square feet, as identified in the site specific educational specifications developed by Baltimore City Public Schools; and to add the condition that Baltimore City Public Schools will pursue boundary alignments and portfolio actions as needed to ensure that Northwood Elementary School attains and maintains the targeted enrollment of 90% state rated capacity.

III. School Safety

A. Survey Report

Joan Schaefer, Deputy Director of the Interagency Commission on School Construction, explained that LEAs were surveyed on their highest security needs, with an emphasis on two best practices; classrooms with areas of visual refuge behind doors lockable from the inside and communication technology. Ms. Schaefer noted that an additional response was received after publication of the report, with the LEA citing door locks as their highest priority.

Ms. Schaefer referred the IAC to costs in the material that were reported by the LEAs. Mr. Schuler noted that the report indicates that the high cost for lockable doors is likely due to open space classrooms, and asked if IAC staff knows how many classrooms simply need locks, rather than renovations to be suitable? Ms. Schaefer responded that Staff does not have that level of detail. Mr. Gorrell noted that the solution would be different in every situation and that each would need to be considered on a case-by-case basis.

B. School Safety Grant Program (SSGP) Applications

Ms. Schaefer referred the IAC to a list of submitted SSGP applications. Because the IAC has expressed an interest in moving projects forward, the LEAs have been asked if there are obstacles to applying for funding. LEAs have reported different reasons, including the desire to wrap up their CIPs, the need for time to collect cost estimates, and the approval of local budgets without a local match for security projects. Ms. Schaefer also noted that HB 1072 (2018) required that the State Center for Child Abuse and Neglect (SCCAN) coordinate with the IAC to jointly develop guidelines and best practices for modification of facilities to reduce opportunities for child abuse. IAC staff met with SCCAN and learned that in some instances best practices for security can conflict with best practices to deter child sexual abuse. Having areas of visual refuge can enhance security, for example, but increase risks for abuse. IAC staff has asked SCCAN to look at outcomes with relevant best practices implemented in Florida to learn more.

IV. Capital Improvement Program (CIP) Timeline and Process

Arabia Davis, Funding Program Manager for the Interagency Commission on School Construction, referred IAC members to the FY 2020 CIP timeline in the meeting agenda. Ms. Davis described the different requirements of the CIP and the timing of each requirement. She noted that the IAC is required to approve 75% of the governor's preliminary budget by December 31st.

Dr. Salmon noted that the approval of the CIP is one of the most important responsibilities of the IAC. Ms. Davis explained that the CIP team, which includes representatives from the Maryland Department of Planning, the Department of General Services, and the MSDE, reviews each CIP application to ensure consistency with State priorities and compliance with eligibility requirements.

V. FY 2020 Capital Improvement Program Preliminary Requests

Ms. Davis noted that the IAC has received CIP requests from all school systems and the Maryland School for the Blind. She referred the IAC to the draft working copy of the CIP recommendations, noting that the recommendations are subject to change based upon project eligibility, contingency funding, Enrollment Growth and Relocatable Classroom (EGRC) funding, and changes to the governor's preliminary capital budget. Ms. Davis explained that the 10-year Average New Funds were used as a consideration to allocate funding, and that the 10-year average is generally consistent with what would be each LEA's allocation if funding was distributed on a per-pupil basis. Ms. Davis explained that smaller LEAs see large variations in funding amounts year over year, as their needs for large projects exceed their average amount in some years, and when large projects are not being undertaken their needs are typically far lower than their average. Ms. Davis noted that IAC staff anticipates changes to funding for Prince George's County once project eligibility issues have been resolved.



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Director Gorrell explained that IAC staff will distribute these preliminary recommendations to the LEAs in order to receive their feedback prior to distribution of the 75% recommendations in December. Staff hopes that by publishing anticipated 100% projections, projects will be able to move forward more quickly as the school systems will have a better understanding of expected State funding.

VI. Site Approvals

A. Frederick County East County North Area Elementary

Upon a motion by Secretary Churchill, with a second by Mr. Gibbons, the IAC voted unanimously to approve the use by the Frederick County Board of Education (FCBOE) of 15.0 acres on Gas House Pike, a half-mile east of McKaig Road (at Tax Map 69, Parcel 202), for the construction of a future elementary school to serve the eastern portion of Frederick County, in the Hamptons West neighborhood, part of the Lake Linganore Planned Unit Development project; adhering to the actions identified in the state clearinghouse review, state identifier MD20180917-0794.

B. Montgomery County Northeast Consortium Elementary #17

Upon a motion by Mr. Gibbons, with a second by Ms. Avara, the IAC voted unanimously to approve the use by the Montgomery County Board of Education (MCBOE) of 10.95 acres at Saddle Creek Drive and Bentley Park Drive in Burtonsville, for the construction of a future elementary school to serve the Burtonsville area; adhering to the actions identified in the state clearinghouse review, state identifier MD 20180314-0174.

VII. Facility Status Changes

A. Property Transfer – St. Mary's County – Mary McLeod Bethune Educational Center Motion Carried Upon a motion by Mr. Gibbons, with a second by Secretary Churchill, the IAC voted unanimously to approve the transfer of the Mary McLeod Bethune Educational Center, 22975 Colton Point Road, Bushville, MaryInad, from the St. Mary's County Public Schools to the St. Mary's County Government.

B. Facilities Status Changes – Informational Items

Michael Bayer, Manager of Infrastructure and Development at the Maryland Department of Planning, referred the IAC to informational facilities status changes.

To rescind IAC Planning Approval for Frederick County Public School System's (FCPS) FY 2011 CIP Addition project at Waverly Elementary School (PSC #10.058.11 LP).

Background Information:

Waverley Elementary was originally constructed in 1969 and has had no significant renovations in the past 49 years. FCPS conducted a feasibility study, which supported a replacement school and was subsequently approved by the Frederick County Board of Education in March 2018 and IAC staff in October 2018.

The IAC staff received a letter dated November 9, 2018 (see attached) from FCPS requesting that planning approval for the FY 2011 CIP Addition project at Waverley Elementary be rescinded. Design and construction were not funded following the FY 2011 planning approval, and there has been significant residential development over the last several years on the west side of Frederick City. To address the increased capacity in the school boundary area, the LEA is requesting planning approval to replace Waverley Elementary (PSC#10.058.20 LP) in their current FY 2020 CIP submission.

Frederick County Public Schools (FCPS) requests rescission of the Fiscal Year (FY) 2011 local planning approval for an addition to Waverley Elementary School (ES).

Design and construction were never funded following the local planning approval. Since that time, significant residential development has been approved, and constructed, on the west side of Frederick City. In addition, Waverley ES was originally constructed in 1969 and has had no significant renovations in the past 49 years. Given the age of the building, and the need for additional capacity in this area of Frederick County, FCPS conducted a feasibility study that resulted in a recommendation to replace the school on site. This recommendation was approved by the Board of Education of Frederick County in March 2018. The Interagency Commission on School Construction (IAC) approved the feasibility study in October 2018.

Project Information:

On April 2nd, 2018 Executive Director Gorrell committed to providing a 10% match of State funds to allow Allegany County to complete Broadband Infrastructure Improvements for Allegany High School. Item I. L. Approval of Accounting Adjustments: Capital Improvement Program Amendment to the FY 2019 CIP for Anne Arundel County

Motion:

To approve an amendment to the FY 2019 Capital Improvement Program to rescind funding in the amount of \$250,000 for Broadneck High Electrical project in Anne Arundel County and to approve the transfer of funds to the LEA Contingency Account reserved for the county.

Background Information:

The LEA is requesting that the funds allocated for the FY 2019 CIP Broadneck High School Electrical project (PSC#02.032.19 SR) be rescinded and transferred to their contingency account due to an unexpected increase to the cost of the project, which exceeds the funds that were appropriated by the county and the State. During the design process, the engineer assigned to the project identified issues with the main switchboard, main electrical system and distributed electrical room space. The new cost to fund this project is estimated to range between \$3.5M and \$4.4M.

Therefore the LEA is requesting that these funds be transferred to their Statewide Contingency Account and used to fully fund the FY 2020 CIP Priority # 16 Lindale Middle School Electrical project

Item I. M. Approval of Accounting Adjustments: Capital Improvement Program Amendment to the FY 2019 CIP for Carroll County

Motion:

To approve an amendment to the FY 2019 Capital Improvement Program to increase funding in the amount of \$136,000 for Linton Springs Elementary in Carroll County and to approve the transfer of funds from the FY 2019 LEA Contingency Account reserved for Carroll County.

Background Information:

In accordance with Education Article §5-303(j), Annotated Code of Maryland, if school construction funds provided to a county in one Fiscal Year Capital Improvement Program (CIP) cannot be allocated to, or used for, the eligible project within two years of the initial authorization, the county may opt to have the funds: 1) applied to another eligible project in the current FY 2019 CIP or 2) reserved in the contingency fund for eligible projects in the county for the FY 2020 CIP.

Each LEA was notified of their reserve contingency balance in September 2018. The increased project allocation shown below reflects the request of Carroll County to amend the FY 2019 CIP as follows:

Good Morning,

We appreciate the opportunity to appear before you today to discuss and review Calvert County's funding request for the FY 2020 Capital Improvement Program. There are 3 projects listed within our CIP for FY 2020, that include State funding requests. We appreciate the IAC staff's 75 percent recommendations which show strong support for these projects. We also appreciate the transparency within the process this year, through the preliminary 100 percent recommendations that reflect full funding of our requests.

Today, we would like the opportunity to highlight the importance of these projects in order to maintain support for full funding. All 3 of our project requests this year are systemic renovations. As Calvert County's inventory continues to age, systemic projects become increasingly important. They are a key component to operating our buildings effectively and efficiently, and aid in providing an appropriate environment for student learning.

Our first project request this year is the Southern Middle School Controls. This is a systemic renovation project consisting of replacement of the building automation system for the HVAC equipment at Southern Middle School. The overall budget for this project is **\$599,625** with a State share of **\$310,000**. The existing pneumatic controls associated with the HVAC system at Southern Middle are at a critical juncture. The existing building controls system is outdated technology and the pneumatic tubing that is connected to a majority of the HVAC equipment is contaminated with oil and water. The constant leaks and calibration issues force CCPS maintenance staff to expend an overabundance of manpower to perform required repairs and provide comfort control for staff and students. The new controls will be state of the art Direct Digital Controls or DDC.

Our second project request is for Patuxent High School HVAC Equipment Replacement. The project scope replaces the existing 117 VAV terminal unit equipment throughout the school as well as a portion of the heating and ventilation units. The existing VAV terminal unit equipment has deteriorated and does not adequately provide conditioned air to the classroom spaces. Additionally, several areas of the building including the gymnasium provide heating only through heating & ventilation units. This equipment will be replaced with energy efficient rooftop units that will supply heating and air conditioning. The overall budget for this project is **\$2,147,375** and will be divided over 2 years to align with actual construction phasing. This year's funding will be for Phase 1 for **\$1,148,000** with a State share of **\$594,000**.

Our third project request is a Calvert Country School HVAC Systemic Renovation. The current HVAC system at this facility is beyond its projected life cycle. The 2 boilers from 1958 and 1983 are old steam generators which limit the use of modern air handling equipment. The chiller was added to the facility in 1983 and has been very problemmatic to maintain over the last few years. The existing through the wall ventilators cannot introduce outside air and are not capable of handling the needs of some individuals being served at this special needs facility. Additionally, the fire alarm is original to the building and requires an upgrade. This project replaces the chiller, boilers, and through the wall air handling units. The central heating and cooling plant equipment will be replaced, new DOAS (dedicated Outdoor Air System) equipment will be incorporated into the HVAC system, and all through the wall units will be replaced. Additionally, the fire alarm system will be upgraded as part of the project. With an overall budget of **\$2,000,000**, the State share is **\$1,034,000**.

In closing, we appreciate the support the IAC has given to Calvert County in the past. Your continued support will ensure that Calvert County can provide safe, healthy, and well-maintained facilities for our staff and students.

Good afternoon, Superintendent Salmon, Secretary Churchill, Secretary McCord and Committee members Avara, Gibbons, Hoffman, Lawlah, Lombardo and Schular.

Joining me today are members of my staff, Chief Administrative and Operations Officer Kevin Smith; Executive Director, Department of Facilities Management Pete Dixit; Chief of Staff Mychael Dickerson: Director of Governmental Relations and Constituent Services Duane Baysmore; Chief Accountability and Performance Management Officer Russell Brown; Executive Director, Department of Fiscal Services George Sarris; Director of the Office of Facilities Construction and Improvement Merril Plait; and Fiscal Analyst Kevin Grabill.

I am in full support of this request, and I would like to thank you for the funds already committed for school construction for FY2020, and to explain why additional funds are needed.

This committee has already recommended \$23.2 million for the FY2020 allocation.

We appreciate this generous support. The revised FY2020 capital budget request of \$168.5 million addresses additional critical system needs, which I would like to take the opportunity to review with you.

Baltimore County has undertaken the largest ten-year construction program in Baltimore County's history. The \$1.3 billion Schools for Our Future program is upgrading and providing modern learning environments for our children and teachers.

As a result of dialogue with our state and county fiscal partners, the school Board, state and county elected officials, communities, and other stakeholders, the focus of our Capital Improvement Plan continues to be centered on four main areas of major concern.

Our first priority is the installation of central air-conditioning in all of our schools through systemic renovation or replacement of schools. BCPS has made substantial progress in the last few years installing central air-conditioning in our older schools. In 2010, 90 schools in Baltimore County lacked central air-conditioning. Our students and staff started this school year in air-conditioned schools in all but eight of our facilities. Next year at this time, the number of schools that lack central air-conditioning will drop to five, and all of them will be completed through renovations or replacement projects that are currently planned as part of the Schools for Our Future program.

Presentation to the Interagency Committee on School Construction Page 2 December 13, 2018

The second priority of our Capital Improvement Plan is focused on accommodating our growing population. Over the last decade, student enrollment increased by 10,171 students – creating an additional need for seats that is roughly equivalent to 14 large elementary schools or eight moderately-sized secondary schools over and above our current 167 buildings. Enrollment is projected to increase from 113,814 students (2018–2019 official enrollment) to over 119,000 students by 2024. With 682 square miles in Baltimore County that equates to over 166 students per square mile (174 by 2024). It is important to note that twenty-three of the top twenty-five priorities in this year's BCPS state capital request will add more than 4,355 new seats that will help to relieve capacity pressures for every area of the county through new or replacement schools, or additions at elementary, middle and high schools.

Our design decisions are carefully made by including the economic analysis of the design by incorporating value engineering, feasibility studies, and energy efficiency analysis, and the development of an educational program. Whenever possible, prototype designs are adapted to the site for improved cost efficiency.

Our third, and no less important priority, is to continue our on-going program to modernize our high schools through either limited renovations or replacement schools. Funding for the limited renovation projects at Patapsco and Woodlawn high schools is included in this year's request. Also included are three new replacement high school projects (Dulaney, Towson and Lansdowne). While these project requests represent the final three major BCPS projects for this Capital Improvement Plan cycle, they also clearly reflect a system wide need to include secondary schools in our capital planning and represent the robust community engagement that we enjoy from stakeholders, not just in one area, but throughout our county, and in all of our communities. We are grateful for their engagement and advocacy.

As a result, BCPS has conducted a study of high school capacities to develop a set of strategies and options for addressing increasing enrollment at this level. The results of this study will inform future capital projects.

Finally, BCPS must remain vigilant in our advancement of the BCPS systemic program to replace aging roofs, boilers, chillers, windows, doors, and other essential building systems which is why we have added the last 12 priority systemic roof and chiller replacement projects to our request.

In order for Baltimore County to focus on the big picture, a comprehensive countywide facilities assessment study was completed by an independent third-party consultant in March 2014. The study identified a countywide capital infrastructure need of \$2.74 billion. That is over and above the funds provided through and including FY2015. Even after considering an infusion of the additional capital funds provided by the county and the state in FY2016, FY2017, and FY2018 of nearly \$530 million, there is still an additional need for over \$2.2 billion to meet current capital infrastructure needs. This \$2.2 billion figure does not include any additional funds that will be necessary to address the growing enrollment trend or any new programmatic requirements.

We have implemented an aggressive program of maintenance management in schools. The multi-pronged strategy consists of daily cleaning and regular preventive maintenance, scheduled maintenance of major equipment, efficient response to routine maintenance requests, and the inclusion of systemic projects in the capital improvement program. As a result, despite this almost overwhelming infrastructure need, the annual state inspection program has consistently given our school inventory an overall rating of "good," with no individual facility receiving a rating lower than "adequate." The Public School Construction Program maintenance effectiveness report ranks Baltimore County at the top of the 5 largest school districts in the state of Maryland.

In 2018, 32 schools were state inspected. Of that sampling, 17 schools received a rating of good, while 15 schools were rated adequate. Over the past ten years, the state inspected 17–33 schools per year. On average, 7% of schools received a rating of superior, 70% of schools received a rating of good, while 23% of schools were rated adequate. Additional positions and resources have been provided and requested in the operating budget to continue to maintain and improve our record as the buildings continue to age.

Unfunded projects of the highest priority include the construction of replacement schools at Berkshire, Colgate, and Chadwick elementary schools. These three schools average over 70 years old and need to be replaced by new schools which would provide a 21st century learning environment. In addition, these three new schools would add 645 much needed seats to relieve persistent overcrowding issues.

We would also request your consideration of including funding for the 12 roof replacement projects and boiler/chiller replacement projects which are included in this request. It is critical that BCPS continues to maintain its aggressive maintenance program in all schools to provide a safe, comfortable learning environment for both students and staff.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to tell you about the success of BCPS' Minority Business Enterprise (MBE) program. One key component in the advancement of our program is our annual "Meet the Primes" event. This event allows minority contractors and subcontractors to meet other prime contractors to explore possible partnership opportunities. The tenth annual "Meet the Primes," held in October, had over 140 prime contractors and other exhibitors with over 740 small and minority firms attending. As a result of our efforts in this area, MBE participation has increased from 23.9% in FY2009 to 34.2% in FY2018.

We have provided additional information for your review of the specific projects that we are here to discuss, and we are happy to respond to your questions.

RE: Baltimore City Public Schools FY2020 Capital Improvement Program (CIP) Appeal - Talking Points

Introduction

- Good morning Dr. Salmon, IAC Commission Members and Designees, and Mr. Gorrell. On behalf of Baltimore City Public Schools' Board of School Commissioners and CEO, I thank you for the opportunity to address the members of the IAC about Baltimore City Public Schools (City Schools) Fiscal Year (FY) 2020 capital improvement priorities.
- We are here to appeal the IAC Designees' funding recommendations for City Schools' FY 2020 CIP. City Schools requested approximately \$85 million in state funds for thirty-seven projects for the FY 2020 CIP. The request included final funding for two (2) major projects, Holabird Elementary/Middle and Graceland Park O'Donnell Heights Elementary/Middle, both selected by the state to be Net Zero buildings, as well as local planning and funding for the renovation of an adjacent site to add capacity to the Maree G. Farring elementary facility. We also requested funding for Armistead Gardens Elementary school, which will be another major redevelopment project to address overcrowding. In addition, the FY 2020 CIP includes thirty-two systemic projects that consist of much needed repairs to various building systems (i.e. roofs, elevators, and air conditioning).
- We thank the IAC for the \$29 million recommended for our FY 2020 CIP requests, and for working with our team to ensure projects were not partially funded and all contingency funds were redirected to other "B" rated projects in the FY 2019 CIP. We would like to use the rest of our time to appeal specific types of projects, discuss impacts of major renovation/replace project funding timeline, and finally express the facility needs of the district if additional funding is provided to the CIP through the governor's budget process.

Fire Safety Projects

 In review of the FY 2020 CIP, the IAC staff did not recommend funding for the sprinkler component of three fire safety projects. We want to take this opportunity to express to the Commission that City Schools continues to assert the need to include both the fire alarm and sprinkler component as one complete fire safety project. City Schools has determined that sprinkler systems are appropriate to be included as a part of the fire safety system to preserve the

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life and safety of students and staff, and the facility asset. This safety concern includes not only the occupants of the building, but also the fire respondents who respond to fire related events at the schools. For Baltimore City, first responders must go into a building when there is a fire instead of addressing the fire outside the facility.

- We also want to highlight the work of Michael Dorn from Safe Havens International for the Commissions consideration. Mr. Dorn has numerous credentials in school safety and security, including serving in various positions in federal, state and local agencies. Mr. Dorn's expertise includes working with various organizations to address local terrorism events such as school shooting events. In his work, Mr. Dorn has noted that fire may also be a method used to terrorize staff and students, and there is historical context that support this information dating back to 1958. In recent years (2014), a New Jersey elementary school experienced a fire and due to the lack of a sprinkler system, the facility was destroyed and students were relocated for three years costing the district millions to support a new facility.
- The cost of installing sprinklers depends on several factors, including building size, height, floor
 plan, location, use or occupancy; proximity to water supplies; construction type; and labor costs.
 The cost is also dependent on whether the sprinkler system is installed in a new or existing
 building. Considering costs, in our opinion, sprinklers are needed where it is feasible for City
 Schools to install them, and the removal of sprinklers from the scope in all fire safety projects
 submitted in the CIP is neglectful and would be a lack of due diligence on City Schools part if we
 did not bring this matter to your attention.
- We are appealing the IAC staff recommendations to include sprinkler systems in the fire safety projects in the FY 2020 CIP request.

Funding Schedules for renovation/replacement projects

- Based on the staff recommendation, we are appealing the requests for Armistead Gardens
 Elementary/Middle school. We are requesting funds to renovate and add to the capacity of
 Armistead Gardens which is a severely overcrowded school. IAC staff noted that the Armistead
 Gardens' renovation and addition project would not be funded due to the timeline for the
 submittal of schematic designs for funding allocation considerations. The Administrative
 Procedures Guide for the PSCP outlines the following requirements for funding a project in
 Section 100, Exhibit 2:
 - September 1, the LEA shall submit a schematic design
 - November 1 the LEA shall submit design development documents, to have the project recommended for funding in the January approvals.

• We would like to highlight the challenges in these guidelines that may not be suitable for local education agencies (LEAs) that do not have local funding to start the design of a project without a state match or are unable to forward fund large design projects. For City Schools' major projects, our local share aligns with the state approval of the project and are received annually in July. If state funding is not granted for a major project, the local match is not allocated. The local allocation covers our design costs and if funding is not approved for the major project, we will not have the local match to start the design process. Without this match, we will be unable to achieve the September and November deadlines requirements for State funding. We request a review of this guideline in consideration of school systems with low tax bases who lack resources to forward fund design projects as City Schools.

Addressing City Schools Need

- Lastly, we would like to reiterate our growing need for replacement of facility systems and support for replacement/renovation of schools. For this fiscal year, it was determined that City Schools would receive an allocation of approximately \$29 million based on the average funding provided by the IAC to City Schools over a ten-year period. While we appreciate the allocation, we want to note that this allocation does not account for the years of recycled funds or demonstrate the growing needs in the district.
- The need for State support and funding in City Schools is great and we continue to look to the State to serve as the equalizer across the LEAs and provide resources to jurisdictions with high needs and limited resources. Unlike many large school systems in Maryland of similar size, City Schools, in comparison, receives less than a 1/3 support from its local jurisdiction. Baltimore City is not resistant to increasing support for City Schools' facility needs. The City has increased CIP local support by a total of \$6 million for FY 2019 through FY 2021, over three years. However, Baltimore City has a low tax base and high concentration of government, nonprofit and other tax-exempt organizations (which represent 30% of Baltimore's entire assessed value based on a report in 2012) that own property but do not pay property taxes. Furthermore, the City does not capture the increasing economic growth to support school facilities. While the City's economy shows growth as private wealth increases, demonstrated in the decrease in the State's contribution in the local-cost share formula, it is important to note that much of the growth has been fueled by tax subsidies without an increase in city revenues. Many owners of our most valuable buildings pay little or no property taxes which represent approximately half of our revenue to payback bonds and support schools.
- Our students should not be negatively impacted due to the socio-political challenges in the City. City Schools' students deserve comfortable learning environments that are warm in the winter,

with adequate building envelopes and supportive spaces. The IAC staff have noted, in review of the district's maintenance survey and assessment, that the districts facility systems and overall conditions scoring will not improve without additional capital support to replace building systems well beyond their useful lifecycle. As we continue to address processes, systems, preventative maintenance and staffing oversight of our facilities, these efforts will only go so far if our systems are not replaced and the deferred maintenance continues to increase over time. As demonstrated in January during the prolonged winter period, our systems will continue to be impacted due to the age of the systems. Therefore, we ask for continued support and funding for our aging schools and building systems in review of our FY 2020 CIP.

Closing

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- In closing, City Schools thanks you for your continued support in addressing the facility needs of Baltimore City students.
- City Schools asks that the IAC recognize the challenges associated with operating aging facilities and consider funding FY 2020 CIP priority projects.

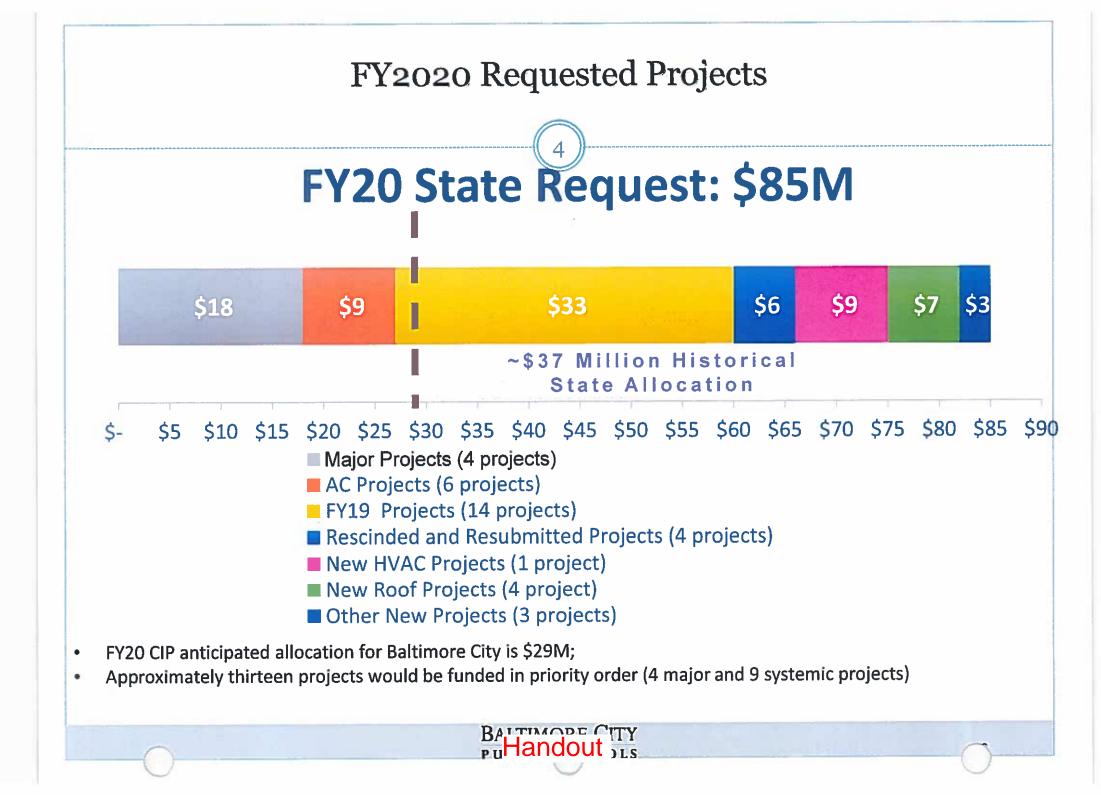

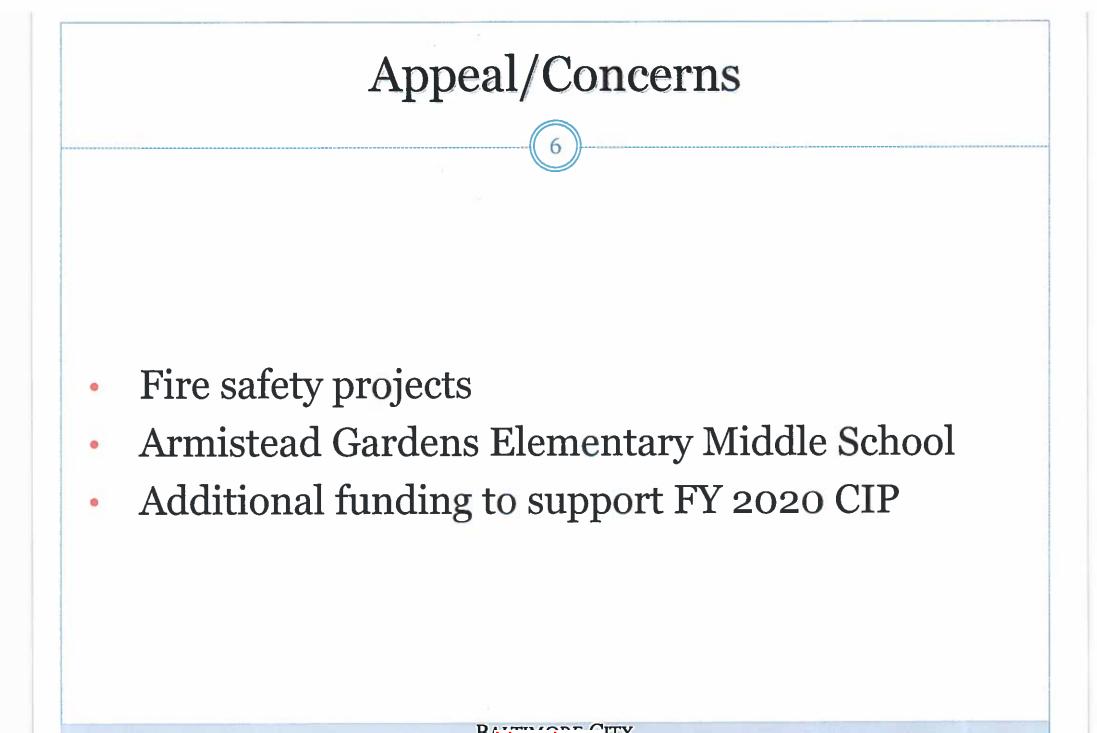




CIP FY2020 Financial Implications

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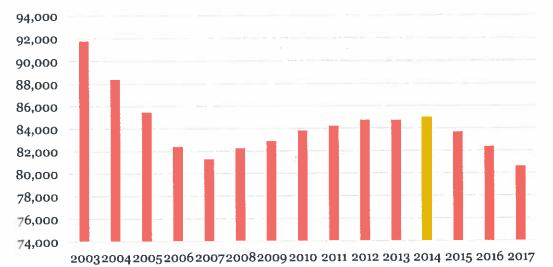
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Enrollment Trends

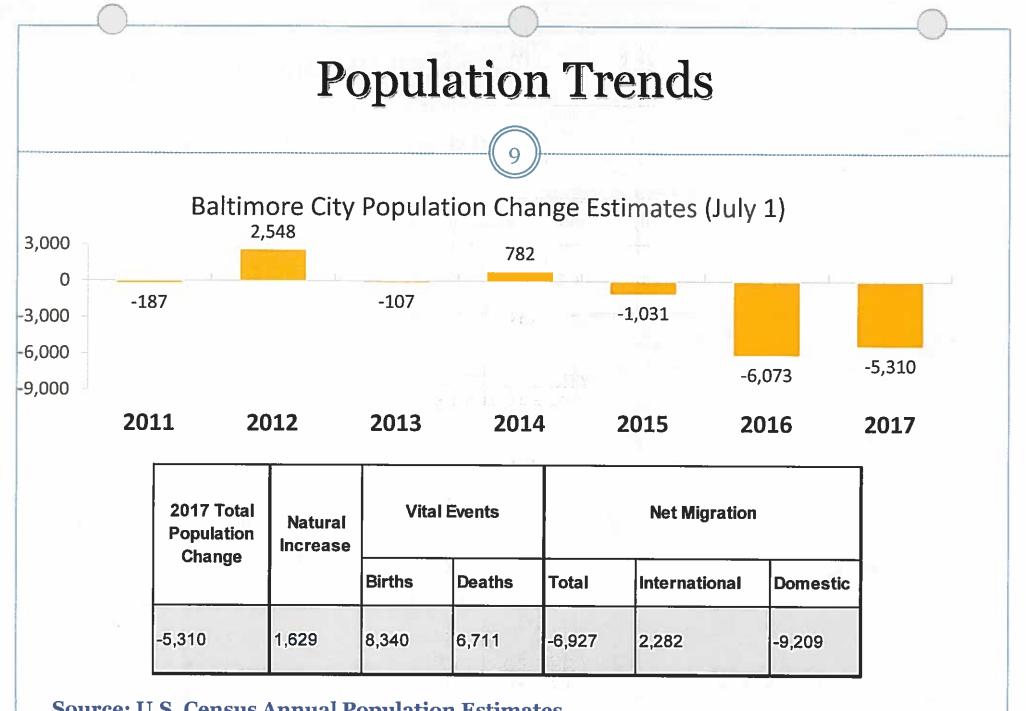

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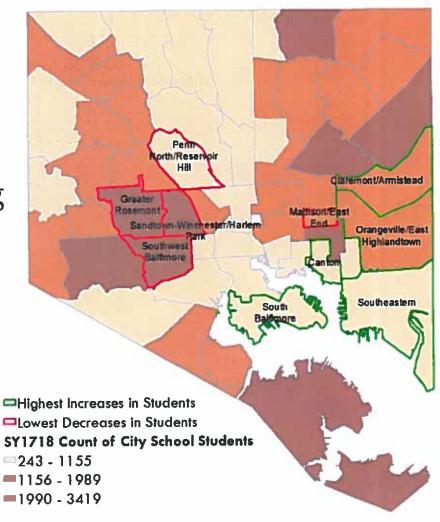

Baltimore City Schools' Enrollment Changes at Neighborhood Level

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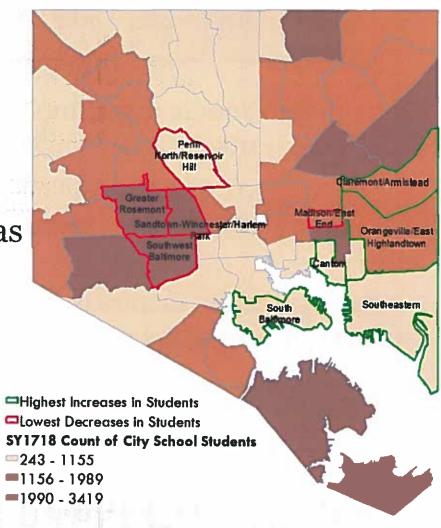

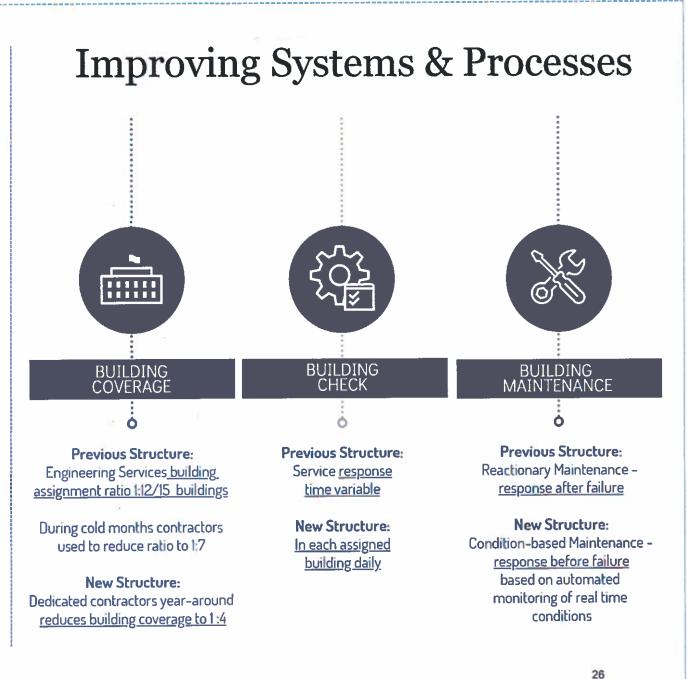

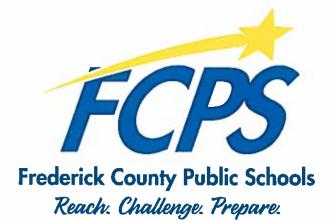

Testimony of Brad W. Young, President Board of Education of Frederick County to the Interagency Commission on Public School Construction December 13, 2018

Good Morning, I am Brad Young, President of the Board of Education of Frederick County. Accompanying me today is Jan Gardner, County Executive for Frederick County, Dr. Theresa Alban, Superintendent of Frederick County Public Schools (FCPS); and Paul Lebo, FCPS Chief Operating Officer.

Thank you for this opportunity to speak to you about our request for capital funding for school construction. Frederick County Public Schools has an enrollment of almost 43,000 students, an increase of nearly 600 students over last year. This is consistent with growth that we have experienced for the last several years. We are expecting another 800 students next year. FCPS has not experienced this level of growth since the 1990s.

FCPS operates and maintains 68 school buildings. These buildings total approximately 6.7 million square feet and occupies over 1,400 acres. Since 1990, we have constructed 26 new or replacement buildings and 25 additions. However, a significant number of buildings are still, in whole or part, 25 or more years old.

As you can see, our FY20 capital funding request reflects our need to address both capacity issues as well as renovation and replacement of our older buildings.

Dr. Alban will speak in more detail about our funding requests in a moment. At this time, County Executive Gardner would like to express the County's support for our FY20 requests. Thank you for your time.

Testimony of Dr. Theresa Alban, Superintendent of Frederick County Public Schools to the Interagency Commission on Public School Construction December 13, 2018

Good Morning. We appreciate the opportunity to come before you to present our FY20 capital funding requests. I will be brief and not repeat what President Young or County Executive Gardner have already discussed.

First, we support your staff's recommendation to fund the remainder of the state's commitment for the new Butterfly Ridge ES, continued funding for the Urbana ES replacement project and the second phase of the Catoctin HS HVAC replacement and initial funding for the Rock Creek School replacement. These projects add needed seats in our highest growth areas of the County - Frederick City, Lake Linganore and Urbana - as well as address urgent aging infrastructure needs.

However, I would note that IAC staff's recommendations do not include funding for several systemic projects that are urgently needed. The four roof sections of Walkersville MS total approximately 70,000 square feet and are 27 years old. There are active leaks in this roof. This project would replace wet insulation and repair the roof where necessary, allowing us to stop the water infiltration at a reasonable cost without replacing the entire roof at this time. The school is scheduled for a major renovation in eight to ten years, with a feasibility study scheduled to begin in three years, at which time a permanent solution will be determined.

Funding has also not been recommended for the upgrades to the security access controls. This project will install new access control systems in 58 of our schools along with associated wiring and programming, tying together our visitor management system

with our security cameras and Alertus notification system as well as securing internal doors.

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The other critical systemic project for FCPS is the replacement of the Green Valley Elementary School water storage tank. The tank is 47 years old, located underground and provides all water needed for the school. It is critical that this tank be replaced prior to a catastrophic tank failure. Loss of this tank would likely require us to close the school while the repair is made.

Finally, I urge you to grant local planning (LP) approval for the three schools requested in FY20; Waverley Elementary replacement, new east Frederick County area elementary and the addition to Oakdale Middle School. All three of these schools serve high residential growth areas where existing schools are significantly over capacity. Waverley Elementary serves the Frederick City area and both the new east Frederick County area elementary and the Oakdale Middle addition will serve the Lake Linganore/I-70 Corridor. At 49 years old, Waverley Elementary is also one of our oldest schools with 83% of the students eligible for free and reduced meals.

We acknowledge that the preliminary recommendations for final FY20 approvals in May 2019 anticipate planning approval for the two elementary schools. However, the addition to Oakdale Middle is not recommended for planning approval. The Oakdale Middle School project will add 298 seats to a school that is located in one of the fastest growing areas of Frederick County. Currently, Oakdale MS enrollment exceeds capacity by 170 seats. Even with the recently recalculated state rated capacity (SRC) of 775, we are currently at 100% of capacity. With the continued residential growth in this area, we anticipate the enrollment in 2025 to be at 1085 students, exceeding capacity by 310 seats.

New Market MS adjoins the Oakdale MS attendance area to the east. With the recalculated SRC, New Market MS is expected to be at 80% of SRC. However, this 44 year old school is an open space school that has had no renovations or major

improvements. The formerly open space classrooms now have temporary walls. Given the open space design, this is not a school to which we would want to add more students. Urbana MS adjoins the Oakdale attendance area to the south. Urbana is also a high growth area of the County. Urbana MS is also over capacity and would not support a redistricting to relieve capacity issues at Oakdale MS.

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FCPS continues to do its part to be good stewards of taxpayer dollars and to address the funding challenges associated with school construction needs. Our approach to school construction models best management practices. We have worked creatively to reduce costs through the use of prototype designs, value engineering and partnerships within our community. We also place a high value on maintaining our facilities.

We feel strongly that our ability to provide a proper academic and instructional program, and our students' ability to achieve high standards, depends on adequate school facilities. Toward this goal, we ask that the State continue to be an active partner with FCPS and Frederick County government and fully meet our school construction capital funding needs.

Testimony of Jan H. Gardner, County Executive Frederick County

to the

Interagency School Construction Commission

December 13, 2018

I am writing to express my strong support for the Frederick County Public Schools fiscal year 2020 (FY20) school construction priorities. The County is fully prepared to provide the local share of all projects and is looking to accelerate school construction to ensure adequate school facilities for all our students. Frederick County's priority projects for FY20 will make significant progress to address some of our county's most critical overcrowding and renovation issues.

Frederick County is growing community. The number of new residential permits are up, new housing developments are under construction, and business is booming. In fact, next year we are projected to add nearly 800 new students; the third year in a row with significant enrollment growth. Between 2011 and 2014, the former Frederick County Board of Commissioners approved 14,400 new residential housing units and guaranteed the developers the ability to build with Developer Rights and Responsibilities contracts. Most of this residential growth is planned in the Urbana, New Market and Lake Linganore areas of the county, with Frederick City being our fastest growing municipality. Frederick County remains challenged to provide and time needed public schools with already approved housing.

I fully support the priority order of projects identified by the Board of Education in their FY20 request; the county will provide our share of funding for these projects. These projects have been thoughtfully planned, often in tandem, so that Frederick County can maximize resources and keep project costs down. We are good stewards of taxpayer dollars, often providing forward funding to keep projects on schedule. I am very proud of the excellent relationship Frederick County Government has with Frederick County Public Schools, including Dr. Alban, the Board of Education and their staffs. We work collaboratively, engaging in innovative thinking and problem solving, to maintain a robust school construction schedule.

This year, I went to the Board of Education in October shortly after the September 30 enrollment numbers were released, and asked for their support to accelerate design for two additional desperately

needed projects in our fastest growing area of the county. I was not surprised to receive unanimous support. Today, I come to this Commission with three requests:

1. Support for the FY20 Frederick County Board of Education request.

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- 2. Planning approval for Waverley Elementary School as well as planning approval for a new East County Area Elementary School and an addition for Oakdale Middle School. The County has passed supplemental budget amendments for design to advance these projects in the County's Capital Improvement Program. The County is committed to fund these projects, but we need the State's support and agreement to advance these projects. These projects are needed now and simply cannot wait.
- 3. Support for FCPS systemic projects, which Dr. Alban will highlight in her remarks.

A new East County Area Elementary School will alleviate overcrowding at both Oakdale Elementary School and Deer Crossing Elementary School. Current enrollment at Deer Crossing Elementary is at nearly 140% of state rated capacity. Additional sections of residential subdivisions adjacent to these schools will be completed and move-in ready very soon. All of the students coming from this residential development would either attend Oakdale or Deer Crossing Elementary Schools, further compounding overcrowding conditions.

Oakdale Middle School enrollment was nearly 120% of capacity before the school enrolled more than 90 students above their projected capacity this summer. I visited both Oakdale Elementary and Oakdale Middle on the first day of school, and I personally saw the overcrowding conditions. At Oakdale MS, specials classes are crowded with an excess of 40-50 students. Portable classrooms add some extra capacity, but enrollments are expected to continue to climb during the school year and for the foreseeable future, so long term portable classrooms are not a viable or best option. It is my hope that by accelerating design for these schools, the County will also be able to accelerate construction if the State awards planning approval and commits to their share of funding in the future. The county will forward-fund these projects to keep them on an expedited timeline while we wait for State funding.

Frederick County has a proven track record of responsibly managing projects, meeting timelines, using proven prototype design, forward funding the State share until the State can reimburse us, and maintaining our schools to meet the State's strict maintenance standards. Frederick County is doing its part and is committed to providing the County share of funding for FY20 request. Thank you for supporting Frederick County students and our schools.

Appeal of Montgomery County Public Schools to the Interagency Commission on School Construction Funding Recommendations for the Fiscal Year 2020 Capital Improvements Program

December 13, 2018

Good morning Dr. Salmon and members of the Interagency Commission on School Construction. I am Jack Smith, superintendent of schools for Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS). Joining me today is Dr. Andrew Zuckerman, chief operating officer, MCPS; Mr. James Song, director, Department of Facilities Management; and Ms. Adrienne Karamihas, director, Division of Capital Planning, Department of Facilities Management. On behalf of the members of the Board of Education, thank you for this opportunity to present our appeal of the IAC's staff recommendations on the FY 2020 state school construction funding for MCPS.

The Montgomery County Board of Education's FY 2020 Capital Improvements Program (CIP) request is \$113.8 million. The staff recommendation is to fund \$45.95 million of this request. We believe that there is adequate justification for all of the funds included in the request, and therefore, we are appealing the \$67.83 million balance that was not recommended for state funding. Attached for your consideration is our appeal, which includes planning approval for 10 projects; planning approval and construction funding for 8 projects; and construction funding for 4 projects (Attachment 1).

As indicated on Attachment 1, the following four forward-funded construction projects, priorities 11 and 13–15, were not recommended for full funding by the IAC staff:

- Lucy V. Barnsley Elementary School—11 classroom addition project completed September 2018, received partial funding.
- Potomac Elementary School—Revitalization/expansion project, currently under construction, anticipated to be completed January 2020, received partial funding.
- S. Christa McAuliffe Elementary School—10 classroom addition project, anticipated to be completed September 2019, received no funding.
- Seneca Valley High School—Revitalization/expansion project, anticipated to be completed September 2020, received partial funding.

In addition, the following eight projects, priorities 16–31, have been forward-funded by Montgomery County in order to address the overutilization and aging infrastructure of these schools. It is vital that state planning approval and funding is approved in order to make available those local dollars for other capital projects in the county.

- Ashburton Elementary School Addition
- Tilden Middle School/Rock Terrace School Revitalization/Expansion
- Maryvale Elementary School/Carl Sandburg School Revitalization/Expansion

- Thomas W. Pyle Middle School Addition
- Takoma Park Middle School Addition
- Pine Crest Elementary School Addition
- Montgomery Knolls Elementary School Addition
- Walt Whitman High School Addition

These 12 projects noted approximately will provide 170 classrooms, or nearly 3,800 seats, to address our overutilization in schools throughout the county. Also, these projects will address aging infrastructure either by replacing existing facilities that have reached the end of their life-cycle or by the replacement of specific building systems during the capital project. Therefore, all 12 projects must be fully funded as requested by the Board of Education.

On October 23, 2018, we received the annual issues letter that identified outstanding questions and issues as a result of the designees' review of our state CIP submission. Our responses to those questions were forwarded to Mr. Robert Gorrell, executive director, IAC, on October 31, 2018, (Attachment 2) and are incorporated in our Revised FY 2020 State CIP request. Therefore, these projects should be funded as requested by MCPS.

MCPS continues to experience another year of student enrollment growth; however, our enrollment growth is increasing at a lower rate than we have experienced during the past 10 years. Official September 30, 2018, student enrollment is 162,680, for a one-year increase of 1,134 students. Since the 2009–2010 school year, enrollment has increased by 20,903 students. This is a remarkable amount of growth for any school system to accommodate. We do not anticipate that this relative slowdown in enrollment growth will last long, and therefore, we must continue to address our backlog of capacity projects and aging infrastructure through our many capacity and systemic replacement projects.

Total MCPS enrollment by the 2024–2025 school year is projected to increase by 11,642 students to reach 174,322 students. Adding the projected 11,642 student increase to the 20,903 student increase since 2009 results in a total projected increase of 32,545 students during the 15-year period from 2009 to 2024. The following chart displays the official September 30, 2018, student enrollment for this year and the previous five years, as well as the enrollment projection for the 2024–2025 school year.

MCPS is engaged in several efforts to reposition the CIP and facility planning processes within the context of the changing enrollment, land use, and population dynamics that have become the "new normal" in Montgomery County. A primary focus of this work is to ensure that the CIP is both a robust plan for the immediate future and sufficiently flexible to appropriately respond when conditions change. A key element of our facility planning processes is our enrollment forecasting. Our challenge increasingly has been to tailor the countywide projection model to the variances that exist among the regions and neighborhoods within Montgomery County. MCPS continues to work with our agency partners and external consultants to increase the ability to understand the impact of various enrollment factors closer to the school level.

Another major effort by MCPS has been to review the revitalization/expansion program to develop a multi-variable approach to determine the relative priority of large-scale renovations, including programmatic and capacity considerations. As MCPS worked through the evaluation of the previous process and factors that could be used in a new process, it was evident that the need for flexibility with respect to these major capital projects was imperative, as was the need to include instructional program priorities and the impact of overutilization.

Our new approach, begins with an assessment of all of our schools. The assessment evaluates the key facility indicators that impact a school environment, ranging from major system infrastructure, to security, to interior elements and features. This facility data will be the starting points for analysis of multiple educational facility objectives to provide context for planning major capital projects with a scope of work that improves a school's needs as it relates to facility condition, capacity, and educational program.

It is crucial that our state aid request be approved in order to meet the substantial capital funding needs for MCPS. We have significant construction needs, and now more than ever, we need strong financial support from the state for our school construction program. It is imperative that the state partner with MCPS to maintain our commitment to provide excellent facilities for our students and staff. MCPS students comprise 18.2 percent of the state's total student enrollment. As indicated in the following chart, the state funding share of our capital program has not kept pace with our unprecedented enrollment growth. If we have any hope of closing our capacity gap and addressing our aging facilities, it is essential to receive additional state dollars.

With the need to provide permanent seats for our student population and address the aging inventory of older school facilities, funding for our CIP continues to be a critical issue. Montgomery County continues to provide substantial financial support in our efforts to increase the capacity of our public school facilities and maintain and improve our older school facilities. However, even this commitment of local funds to support school construction is not enough to address our needs. In order for us to meet our obligations to our students, we depend on our partnership with the state to provide its share of our school construction program. I, along with the Board of Education, Montgomery County Government officials, and our state delegation will continue to work together to advocate for an increase in state construction funding to enable Montgomery County to receive its fair share of the statewide allocation for our capital projects.

In May 2018, the Montgomery County Council adopted the MCPS *FY 2019 Capital Budget and the FY 2019–2024 Capital Improvements Program* and approved \$1.777 billion for the six-year period. The adopted CIP included funding for the planning, design, and/or construction of 19 elementary school capacity projects, 6 middle school capacity projects, 7 high school capacity projects and 6 revitalization/expansion projects. Also, the adopted CIP included funding for the many countywide systemic projects that will allow MCPS to upgrade or replace various building systems at many of our schools throughout the county.

Without additional funding, the school system will continue to operate in a constant state of "catch up" and remain far behind in providing adequate classrooms for the burgeoning enrollment. We urge the state to increase the overall school construction funding and provide the aid required to address the long-standing capacity needs and program requirements we have presented as part of our budget request, supporting documentation, and appeal information.

We appreciate the past support for state school construction funding in Montgomery County. We would not have the quality facilities we have today were it not for the support of the IAC and the Public School Construction Program. We look forward to working with you to ensure that the students of our county continue to learn in well-designed buildings that accommodate enrollment and provide the educational programs of which we are very proud. Thank you for your time and attention to our concerns and for your consideration of our state aid request.

Good Morning Members of the Interagency Commission (IAC) and staff of the Public School Construction Program (PSCP):

- For the record, my name is <u>Dr. Monica Goldson</u> and I am here today with my Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) staff <u>Dr. Mark Fossett, Associate</u> <u>Superintendent of Supporting Services, Mr. Shawn Matlock, Director of Capital</u> <u>Programs, Ms. Shayla Taylor, Acting Supervisory, and Ms. Elizabeth Chaisson, Capital</u> <u>Improvement Program Officer</u>.
- Thank you for inviting us here this morning and giving us an opportunity to appeal the funding recommendations for our FY 2020 capital projects.
- Overall we are pleased with the recommendations. Most of our projects received an 'A' funding status, and we have received 'local planning' approval on the projects that absolutely need to move forward this coming year.
- Today, Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) is appealing the first 75% of recommendations of \$13,288,000 plus \$12,539,000 in Enrollment Growth in Relocatable Classrooms (EGRC) funding out of the total request of \$73,834,000. The annual allocation should be closer to \$22 million to reflect our 10-year average allocation of \$29.3 million plus EGRC funding to relieve overcrowding.
- Specifically, we wish to appeal the balance of construction funding, \$5,676,000, for New Glenridge Area Middle School. This new 1200 student school is slated to open at the same time as fully funded and enlarged William Wirt Middle Replacement School in August 2021. Together both schools will increase capacity by 1600 seats and relieve severe overcrowding among the northern area middle schools.
- For the record, we are also appealing the balance of construction funding, \$17,733,000, for New Cherokee Lane Elementary Replacement School. This pilot replacement school will be almost double the size of the current school, thus relieving over-enrollment among elementary schools in the Adelphi area of the County and eliminating the need for an additional 'Adelphi Area' Elementary School.
- We appreciate all of the additional work the State staff has done to move this project forward considering the fact that legislation for the pilot was created in late Spring 2018. As a new pilot project, we understand that full funding (\$17,734,000) is contingent upon being under construction by October 1, 2019. However, we would like a stated commitment.

 In conclusion, please consider increasing our allocation such that New Glenridge Area Middle School and Cherokee Lane Elementary Replacement are fully committed for State funding, and thank you, again, for continuing to work with us to keep Cherokee Lane Elementary Replacement School on track to receive additional funds through SB 92 - the Public School Construction Innovation Incentive Pilot Program.

Remarks by Dr. George Arlotto Appeal of IAC Staff Recommendation December 13, 2018

Good morning Dr. Salmon and members of the Commission. I am George Arlotto, the proud Superintendent of Anne Arundel County Public Schools, and I am pleased to be here this morning to discuss our Fiscal Year 2020 Capital Improvement Program (CIP).

I would like to begin by thanking the Commission for the continued support that Anne Arundel County has received over the years. I would also like to thank the IAC staff for recommending approval of and projected approval for our FY 2020 requests that have been moved forward for your consideration. Every funding request continually provides us with the capability to extend the useful life of our assets, address enrollment growth, reduce the ever-growing backlog of projects, and provide safe and secure learning environments.

As a county, we have demonstrated our commitment to our CIP and have aggressively sought ways to fund and improve it. We, along with our valued partners in local government, have found ways and developed practices such as:

- generating additional County funds by extending the local bond duration for public school construction projects from 20 to 30 years;
- undertaking detailed feasibility studies on each major project to ensure that the renovation vs. replacement decision point is fully vetted;
- routinely using prototype designs for replacement schools;
- configuring renovations to maximize the use of the existing footprint and;
- utilizing sound life-cycle costing, value engineering techniques, and proven project delivery methods to drive decision making and ensure the public receives effective and efficient end products.

We continue to use a balanced and targeted approach to our Capital Budget requests and CIP. With our independently produced and externally validated Strategic Facilities Master Plan, our Educational Facilities Master Plan, and the Comprehensive Maintenance Plan, we are able to formulate our needs and resources into a prioritized, operational plan that closely integrates our capital improvements and maintenance activities. These practices afford us opportunities

to address the need for safe and secure schools, and advance our educational missions, goals, and programs, while allowing us to balance the resources that we have available.

We are dedicated to the strategic implementation of this sound plan, and in order to keep our CIP whole and balanced, we are requesting your continued support and funding approval for the following projects:

Our first appeal is for additional first-year construction funding for Crofton Area High School. This project is under construction and scheduled to be completed in August 2020. The Crofton Area High School project was locally bid and approved for Local Planning Authority in FY 2018. The maximum state allocation was calculated at the FY 2018 funding level. However, that funding included contingency. Therefore, we are appealing the net state funding amount inclusive of a release of the contingency that was included in the original maximum state allocation approved in FY 2018. Alternatively, we are requesting that the contingency amount be put in the State-wide contingency account reserved for Anne Arundel County.

Next, we are requesting local planning and construction funding approval for the Kindergarten and Pre-Kindergarten addition at Linthicum Elementary School. This addition will provide appropriately sized early childhood classrooms with restrooms and remove existing relocatable classrooms. Linthicum ES has had fullday kindergarten since the 2006-2007 school year.

Our last appeal is for two systemic projects: a roof replacement at Maryland City Elementary School and an electrical enhancement project at Lindale Middle School. Our systemic projects are the mainstay of our CIP. We thank you in advance for your consideration today of our request to reallocate the FY 2019 TIMS systemic appropriation to the Lindale Middle School project. The State's ongoing support of these critical projects allow us to effectively utilize our resources and efficiently extend the useful life of our facilities.

On behalf of our more than 83,000 students, their parents, our employees, the Board of Education of Anne Arundel County, and the community that we serve, I thank you for the opportunity today to discuss our FY 2020 Capital Improvement Program and how it supports Anne Arundel County and the State of Maryland. My staff and I would be pleased to answer any questions that you may have.

The Board of Education of Carroll County appreciates the staff recommendations for a total of \$5,317,000 of funding for the Westminster High Science Room Renovations project, the Winfield Elementary HVAC Replacement project, and the Cranberry Station Elementary Roof Replacement project.

Additionally, the Board of Education of Carroll County appreciates the staff projections for an additional \$1,772,000 of funding to be allocated to these three project in May 2019. This funding amount would fully fund the State share of construction for these top priority projects. The Board of Education of Carroll County respectfully requests that the funding included in these staff projections be approved and included in our final CIP allocations.

Westminster High Science Room Renovations Construction Funding (\$378,000)

This project involves the renovation of six science classrooms and associated prep rooms, totaling 11,186 square feet. These classrooms have not been modified since their original construction in 1970. The renovations will provide a learning environment necessary to deliver quality science instruction to meet the goals of the science program in Carroll County Public Schools.

The project is scheduled to be bid in the spring of 2019 with construction beginning in the summer. The state share of construction funding is needed in FY20 so that the project can remain on schedule.

Winfield Elementary HVAC Replacement Construction Funding (\$1,142,000)

This project involves the replacement of the mechanical system components that are original to the 1991 renovation and addition. This includes the replacement of the air cooled chiller; the floor mounted fan coil units in classrooms; the air handling units serving the cafeteria, media center and gym; the rooftop unit serving the office area; and the two hydronic pumps. It does not include equipment installed in the 2010 additions. Also, the existing two oil-fired boilers, and the existing

two pipe dual temperature water distribution piping will be reused. In order to meet current code requirements for ventilation, this project will also include a Dedicated Outdoor Air System (DOAS) that will provide fresh air to each space. Additionally, the existing pneumatic control system shall be replaced and upgraded to be electronic actuation, direct digitally controlled and interlocked to the County Energy Management System.

The project is scheduled to be bid in the spring of 2019 with construction beginning in the summer. The state share of construction funding is needed in FY20 so that construction can begin next summer.

Cranberry Station Elementary Roof Replacement Construction Funding (\$252,000)

This project will replace the 61,146 square feet of single ply roofing membrane with a new 4-ply built up roof system. The current roof was part of the original construction in 1999 and is currently 19 years old.

Planned replacement of roofing is required to protect the building structure, protect the building components, and preserve the learning environment which supports the educational programs. Without a planned roof replacement program, roofs will begin to fail before they are considered to be replaced. Roof failure allows water infiltration into the building. This could lead to damage of the structural roof deck, interior ceilings, floor and wall finishes, building contents, and it could provide the conditions which lead to air quality issues in the building.

The project is scheduled to be bid in the spring of 2020 so that construction can begin that summer. State funding is needed in FY20 so that funding is in place for construction to begin as soon as school ends in June of 2020. Valuable weeks with no students in the building will be lost if construction funding is not available until July 1, 2020 State funding in FY20 will also help secure the local commitment to provide design funding in fiscal year FY20.

APPEAL TO INTERAGENCY COMMITTEE FOR PUBLIC SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION Prepared by: Jeffrey A. Lawson, Ed.D. Superintendent of Schools December 13, 2018

On behalf of the Board of Education of Cecil County, we submit these comments in support of our FY 2020 Capital Improvement Plan. We appreciate your continued efforts to make public school construction funds available to those jurisdictions with the most pressing needs. The following project received partial approval as part of the first round of recommendations. We would like to make an appeal as our County continues to struggle with high priority needs and an ever increasing deferred maintenance list.

1. Chesapeake City Elementary School - Replacement

As you are aware Chesapeake City Elementary School is our only request for FY2020. This elementary school serves the Chesapeake City area community, but is at the end of its useful life. In 2015, a feasibility study was conducted to determine if the building should be renovated or replaced. The study concluded the building should be replaced due to the nature and age of the original construction as well as the multiple additions which were constructed over many years. Local Planning was approved in last year's CIP. Schematic Design documents were approved on October 22, 2018. We submitted Design Development documents on November 2, 2018, and are currently awaiting review comments. We have proceeded with the Construction Documentation at our own risk so not to hold up the anticipated start of construction in the summer of 2019.

While we are thankful for the initial partial funding of \$2,213,000, we respectfully request that you recommend the additional \$1,787,000 of the FY20 CIP submission, which will allow our county to contribute and fund their portion of this project. We respectfully request the additional \$1,787,000 of the FY20 CIP to begin the construction project at Chesapeake City Elementary School.

Conclusion

We wish to recognize the significant commitment on the part of the State of Maryland, Cecil County Council, and Cecil County Board of Education to improving school facilities in our County. Both the County and State should be commended for this financial commitment, especially in light of competing fiscal needs. We find ourselves, however, in the unfortunate position of being a low-wealth county with aging buildings and new mandated programs. Our long-term strategic plan for the capital improvement plan is to decrease the total amount of deferred maintenance across our County, while improving the instructional environment for our students and staff.

We thank you for providing us this opportunity to come before you to address school facility improvement needs in Cecil County. We appreciate the consideration already given to Cecil County as reflected in the Designee's recommendation and hope you will give careful consideration to our comments in your very difficult deliberations.

AN APPEAL TO THE INTERAGENCY COMMITTEE REGARDING THE FY 2020 MARYLAND SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND PUBLIC SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM REQUEST

Dear Dr. Salmon, Chair and Members of the Commission:

As the new Superintendent of the Maryland School for the Blind, I appreciate this opportunity to appeal the School's FY 2020 Capital Improvement Program (CIP) allocation of \$8M. The School requests \$16M to complete the current Newcomer-Case-Campbell construction project in a timely manner and within budget.

As a statewide school serving the most vulnerable student populations from all 24 Maryland jurisdictions, the School is extremely grateful that the State has supported the significant safety and accessibility upgrades to our campus by including the MSB in the Public School Construction program through the passage of House Bill 1391 of 2012 (Chapter 144 of the Laws of Maryland of 2012).

This legislation enabled the School to request funding through the IAC during a time-limited period from 2013 to 2028 to replace its aging, inaccessible facilities. These facilities, mostly constructed in the 70s or much earlier, were designed for academic blind students at a time when students enrolled in the school did not have significant multiple disabilities. As such, the facilities were not designed, or suitable, for the current population of students who have significant medical, emotional, behavioral and physical needs.

By serving these students, MSB supports the efforts of local school systems to provide educational programs here within the state and averts the need for expensive out-of-state placements. In addition, the improved facilities are needed to accommodate the school's growing enrollment and high staff ratios required to educate these students in an effective manner. Over the past 10 years, the on-campus student body has grown from 185 to 213 students.

The MSB has completed the following construction of the 2020 Campus Master Plan:

- Phase I Multiple Disabilities Blind classroom and cottages facilities in 2014
- Phase II Autism-Blind Classroom and cottages facilities in 2016
- Phase III Preschool, Early Learning and Outreach facility in 2017

In September 2017, the School began Phase IV construction of the Newcomer-Case-Campbell classroom buildings, a \$45.2M endeavor. Based on extended construction timelines, this is now scheduled to be completed in 2021.

Funding Issue

MSB is a 501(c)(3) non-profit private school. Unlike local school systems, MSB does not have taxing authority to generate revenue for construction.

The School has planned for the required 7% match and non-approved costs which amount to 20% of the total project cost. For the \$45M project, 27% of the total cost amounts to over \$12M.

To forward fund Phase II Autism Blind and Phase III Preschool construction projects and to stay on schedule, the School secured bank loans amounting to \$24M in total with an annual debt service of \$2.4M for the next 15 years. The current value of MSB's endowment is \$41M and current loan covenants require MSB to maintain a \$30M endowment balance.

MSB continues to explore the committee's recommendations from our initial meeting on October 15.

As a strategy to determine potential savings in order to address the funding shortfall, a recommendation was made to determine whether any portion of the current construction project could be deferred or abandoned.

The Newcomer-Case-Campbell structure serves all of the students across campus, contains the most classrooms of any building on campus, a gymnasium, career education and transition classrooms and also includes essential program services including the campus library, central kitchen and cafeteria. The renovation will be a significant improvement, being fully accessible, improving energy efficiency and providing a more suitable learning environment for MSB's students.

This building is an interconnected set of buildings that function as a single structure. Due to this, code requirements are shared as well as safety systems, including sprinklers and fire alarms. The MEP (mechanical, electrical and plumbing) systems are interconnected and would require completion even if a portion of the project was suspended or abandoned.

Newcomer and Campbell are first in this phase of construction, which is more than half way complete, with a projected move-in date of this spring, June 2019. The Case portion of construction will not be completed until 2021 based on the extended timeline.

This phase was originally designed as a thirty-month project. Last year the School developed a plan to slow down construction in order to address the cash flow problem.

For every month the School delays the project, there are associated general conditions costs estimated at \$100,000 per month. If our appeal for \$16M were granted, MSB could get construction back on schedule and save eleven months of construction costs, a non-budgeted additional cost of around \$1,100,000.

A bridge loan could be an effective vehicle to address the cash flow and get the project back on a thirty-month track; however, so far the School has been advised that it has reached its debt limit and cannot acquire additional loans.

After careful consideration, the School has determined that deferment of a portion of this project at this point, in the middle of construction, would not provide meaningful financial benefit or improve construction cash flow, and could cause a catastrophic problem of incomplete safety systems, MEP and a lack of a central kitchen.

MSB has met with the Maryland Health and Higher Educational Facilities Authority (MHHEFA), as recommended, which in accordance with its mission is able to provide assistance to MSB based on our 501(c)(3) nonprofit status. MSB is following up with financial advisors to determine whether there is a possible alternative to our current financing with more competitive tax exempt rates and potentially a bridge loan to improve both the School's cash flow and its financial position in the long term. However, all of that is to be determined in the future and will require at least a few months of additional work.

The School will diligently continue to pursue every strategy to bring the current project to completion cost effectively. As MSB pursues these strategies, it respectfully requests that the IAC increase the current allocation from \$8M to \$16M for Newcomer-Case-Campbell.

Beyond the \$1M in cost savings, the urgency of the School's request is based on the immediate need to bring this project to completion for students who are sensitive to this environmental disruption, noise, dust, and needing to remain in less than ideal swing space for an additional year.

We are highly appreciative of the recommendations made by the staff of the Interagency Commission (IAC) on School Construction for partial funding on three projects and one planning approval project in the FY 2020 CIP. After a period of relative inactivity on facilities, the Board of Education of Kent County, the County Commissioners, and the community have recognized that high-quality public school educational programs require healthy, safe, and educationally appropriate teaching facilities. The IAC staff recommendations provide encouragement to our ambitions to improve all the educational facilities in our school system.

In the summer of 2017, the Superintendent and Board of Education undertook a comprehensive Six-Year Facilities Strategic Plan to examine the future of facilities in Kent County. Like many school systems, Kent County Public Schools faces severe fiscal constraints in its operating budget. In these circumstances it is reasonable to look to facility operations, one of the largest areas of expenditure, for potential savings. To this end, the Board recently closed two elementary schools. The strategic planning process had two main goals: 1) consider whether further closures and consolidations were warranted, and 2) develop the scope and urgency of capital projects needed in the remaining schools.

In February, the Six-Year Facilities Strategic Plan was approved by the Board and the County Commissioners. The Plan outlined a set of near-term projects with considerable urgency and a number of longer-term projects that require intensive preparation, community participation, and financial support. The projects presented in the FY 2020 CIP were approved by the Board of County Commissioners and are among those noted in the first group. The four projects in the FY 2020 CIP require immediate attention due to: 1) increased enrollment in the remaining elementary schools due to closure of two elementary schools, 2) the age of the facilities, and 3) security concerns. In order to proceed with these much needed projects, we are requesting full funding from the Interagency Commission for the three projects as outlined:

Priority No. 1: Rock Hall Elementary School Roof Replacement - Funding Request

This project will replace the deteriorated roof and provide interior lighting to the renovated spaces included in Priority No. 4. Rooftop mechanical equipment installed in 2002, will be protected and re-installed. In addition, new drains, scuppers and roof accessories will be installed as needed. Full funding is required to allow roof construction to begin in June 2019. This project will be fully coordinated with the targeted renovations.

FY 2020 Funding Request:

\$587,000

IAC Staff Recommendation:	\$440,000
Balance of Funding Appealed:	\$147,000

Priority No. 2: Galena Elementary School, H. H. Garnet Elementary School, Kent County Middle School, and Kent County High School Security Vestibules – Funding Request

This project will install security vestibules in four schools (the security vestibule at the fifth school, Rock Hall Elementary School, will be funded through the Safe Schools Grant Program). These installations will provide a more secure area for our schools to monitor visitors. Bridging documents have been completed, a design-build team has been engaged through intergovernmental cooperative purchasing, an experienced project manager procured, and construction will be ready to begin this spring. We are requesting full funding to expedite delivery as soon as possible.

FY 2020 Funding Request:	\$131,000
IAC Staff Recommendation:	\$56,000
Balance of Funding Appealed:	\$75,000

Priority No. 4: Rock Hall Elementary Renovation - Funding Request

The school has a large number of students with special needs (Free and Reduced Price Meal, English Language Learner, and Individualized Educational Program) requiring additional flexible spaces designed to meet the needs of students. This project will convert and adapt a number of former high school spaces to fit the needs of elementary school students. The closure of two elementary schools in the FY 18 SY resulted in the student enrollment to nearly double at this school. Spaces that were previously dedicated to science, art and other functions bad to be re-purposed as classrooms due to increased enrollment. The project will provide appropriately sized spaces designed for a complete elementary school educational program: early childhood suite, science, music, and art classrooms. In addition, several interior spaces will receive daylighting through the roof replacement project (Priority No. 1).

Balance of Funding Appealed:	\$206,000
IAC Staff Recommendation:	\$617,000
FY 2020 Funding Request:	\$823,000

We would like to thank the staff for recommending planning approval for the Galena Elementary School Roof, HVAC and Targeted Renovations request (Priority No. 3). This project will replace critical building systems and enhance the learning environment through improved circulation, daylighting of interior spaces, and correction of a number of ADA deficiencies. Once the project is complete, the renovated building will not require additional work for several decades. We hope that this project will also be supported by the IAC.

We appreciate the cooperation and guidance provided by the IAC staff as Kent County Public Schools initiates a well-considered, long-term program to upgrade our educational facilities. We look forward to a favorable outcome to our requests. We will be happy to provide additional information to address any concerns raised by members of the IAC.

On behalf of Washington County Public Schools (WCPS), the Board of Education, and the citizens of Washington County, we want to thank the Interagency Commission on School Construction (IAC) for its consideration of IAC staff recommendations for \$9,379,000 in funding for three of our four requested capital projects: the Sharpsburg Elementary School Replacement, the Urban Educational Campus – BOE Component, and the Boonsboro Elementary School Roof Replacement. Item III. A. Innovation Incentive Pilot Program – Preliminary Approval for Prince George's County – Cherokee Lane Elementary School

Motion:

To make a preliminary approval of Cherokee Lane Elementary School in Prince George's County to participate in the Innovation Incentive Pilot Program (IIPP) in the FY 2020 Capital Improvement Program with an anticipated increase in their State share of eligible costs by 20%. Approval for participation in the Pilot Program will be reassessed upon contract approval, and will not be final until financial closeout demonstrates that the project achieved a cost per student at or below the IIPP threshold amount for FY 2020.

Background Information:

SB 92 (2018 Md. Laws, Chap. 398) creates Education Article §5-323, Annotated Code of Maryland, which establishes a five-year pilot program for Harford, Prince George's, and Washington Counties.

SB 92 is attached for your information, and requires the IAC to calculate each year the "rolling State average of public school construction costs" per student for each type of school (elementary schools, middle schools, high schools, and PK-8 schools). If a public school construction cost has an estimated cost per student that is 30% or more below the rolling state average for the appropriate type, the IAC shall approve that project for participation in the Incentive Program.

- For projects approved to participate in the program on or before December 31, 2019, the State share of eligible costs increases by 20%
- For projects approved to participate in the program on or after January 1, 2020, the State share of eligible costs increase by 10%.

Currently one project has applied for participation in the IIPP. However, additional projects within the 3 pilot program counties can continue to request participation until final approval of the FY 2020 CIP or in a future CIP cycle.

Staff has been working to determine the appropriate methodology for calculating the rolling State average as required. Staff has determined that the State threshold for participation in the IIPP during the FY 2020 Capital Improvement Program cycle for elementary school applicants is \$30,510 per student based upon the following methodology:

- 1. Reported construction costs, including site, for elementary school CIP projects, including new construction, replacement, renovation, and renovation/addition school projects were considered.
- 2. The data set includes actual contract amounts for schools that bid in the last three fiscal years (FY 2015 to FY 2017).
- 3. Once the data set was identified, the average cost per student was calculated for each school in the set, by dividing the number of proposed students submitted to the IAC in the most recent CIP submission by the actual cost of construction contracts to determine each school's cost per student.
- 4. The average cost per student was calculated for 29 elementary schools in the sample set resulting in \$43,586 which was reduced by 30% as required by statute, to reach the IIPP total cost per student threshold for FY 2020 of \$30,510.

For FY 2020, the IAC received one CIP project request for participation in the Innovation Incentive Pilot Program (IIPP). Under the described methodology, IAC staff believes that the Cherokee Lane Elementary School project as presented should be preliminarily approved for participation in the Innovation Incentive Pilot Program. However, the project has not yet been designed, and the LEA will need to take care to ensure that the project costs continue to be under the State project cost per student threshold applicable to FY 2020 projects.

IAC staff will work with the LEA throughout the remainder of the CIP cycle to determine final estimated cost in order to calculate the net state funding, including the 20% higher State share.

In the FY 2020 CIP, the project is currently recommended for \$1,000 in State Participation to establish the first year of funding under the IIPP while the project is in design. Typically, the State does not allocate funding to projects until they are closer to beginning construction. The LEA anticipates the project will bid in February 2020, and as such, would not be eligible for a funding allocation under the regular CIP program. However, to ensure the project proceeds with an IIPP approval status, IAC staff supports the allocation of this small amount.

IAC staff intends to bring a comprehensive procedure to the IAC for consideration and potential adoption in the coming months, and prior to the approval of the final FY 2020 CIP in May 2019.

Statute Text

Article - Education

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§5–323. IN EFFECT

// EFFECTIVE UNTIL JUNE 30, 2023 PER CHAPTERS 397 AND 398 OF 2018 //

(a) (1) In this section the following words have the meanings indicated.

(2) (i) "Construction" means new construction or major renovation or replacement of a public school facility.

(ii) "Construction" does not include system renovation projects as defined in COMAR 23.03.02.15.

(3) "Incentive Program" means the Public School Facility Construction Innovation Incentive Pilot Program.

(4) "Public school facility" means a property primarily used for educational instruction.

(5) "Rolling State average of public school construction costs" means the average State cost per student for public school construction projects and capital improvements over the previous 3 fiscal years.

(b) This section applies only in:

- (1) Harford County;
- (2) Prince George's County; and
- (3) Washington County.

(c) (1) There is a Public School Facility Construction Innovation Incentive Pilot Program in the State.

(2) The purpose of the Incentive Program is to provide incentives to encourage public school systems to pursue innovative public school facility construction projects by:

(i) Providing additional State funding for the projects; and

 Exempting the projects from the statutory and regulatory requirements specified in subsection (j) of this section.

(3) Through the establishment of the Incentive Program, it is the intent of the General Assembly to:

(i) Encourage public school systems to use the Incentive Program; and

(ii) Accelerate public school construction and renovation by providing incentives to reduce the costs of construction and renovation.

(d) (1) The Interagency Commission shall implement and administer the Incentive Program as provided in this section.

(2) The Interagency Commission shall promote the Incentive Program.

(e) The Interagency Commission shall establish an application process for the Incentive Program.

(f) For each fiscal year, the Interagency Commission shall calculate the rolling State average of public school construction costs for elementary schools, prekindergarten through eighth grade schools, middle schools, and high schools in the State.

(g) If a public school facility construction project has an estimated public school construction cost that is 30% or more below the rolling State average of public school construction costs for

the appropriate type of school, the Interagency Commission shall approve that project for participation in the Incentive Program.

(h) (1) For a public school facility construction project that is approved to participate in the Incentive Program on or before December 31, 2019, the State share of eligible costs for that project shall increase by 20% for that project.

(2) For a public school facility construction project that is approved to participate in the Incentive Program on or after January 1, 2020, the State share of eligible costs for that project shall increase by 10% for that project.

(i) If the actual public school construction costs for a project are not 30% or more below the rolling State average of public school construction costs for the appropriate type of school, the project is not eligible for the higher State share provided in subsection (h) of this section for the State share of eligible costs that exceed the requirement in subsection (g) of this section.

(j) Except as provided in subsection (k) of this section, § 2–303(f) of this article, § 5–303 of this subtitle, and the regulations that govern the Public School Construction Program do not apply to a public school facility construction project that is approved to participate in the Incentive Program.

(k) A public school facility construction project that is approved to participate in the Incentive Program shall comply with:

(1) Except as provided in subsection (i) of this section, the State and local cost–share established for each county in regulations;

- (2) The maximum State construction allocation for each project approved for State funding;
- (3) The approval of project funding by the Interagency Commission;
- (4) Smart growth requirements;
- (5) Minority business enterprise requirements;
- (6) Prevailing wage requirements;
- (7) Environmental requirements; and

(8) A requirement for a procurement process that includes public notice and results in the most advantageous proposal.

(I) If a public school system participates in the Incentive Program, nothing in this section prohibits the public school system from utilizing any other source of financing or system of bidding under current law to fund a public school facility construction project.

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Motion:

To approve the Fiscal Year 2020 75% Capital Improvement Program Allocations and Planning Approvals for each school system and the Maryland School for the Blind as shown in the Summary of Project Requests and Recommendations.

Background Information:

Education Article §5-304(b)(2), Annotated Code of Maryland states:

On or before December 31 of each year, the Interagency Commission shall approve public school construction projects that comprise 75% of the preliminary school construction allocation, determined under § 8-113 of the State Finance and Procurement Article, for the following year.

The recommendations are based on an assessment of each LEA's eligible project requests, backlog of previously approved projects, and capacity to carry out approved projects. Each LEA's 10-year average allocation amount has been used as a target for their overall allocation, with variances as needed due to lower requests or higher needs.

The IAC recommendations total \$210 million, or 75% of the preliminary school construction allocation of \$280 million, as required by statute.

Next Steps in the Capital Improvement Program Process

The IAC will be asked to approve additional recommendations to reach 90% of the total construction allocation before March 1, 2019. Final recommendations for the FY 2020 CIP will be completed in mid-April for IAC review, with approval of final allocations to be made after May 1, 2019.

Background Information:

HB 1783 created Education Article, §5-317 of the Annotated Code of Maryland, which creates the School Safety Grant Program (SSGP).

At the August 30, 2018 IAC meeting, the IAC approved staff to release an SSGP application to solicit school safety projects from LEAs and the Maryland School for the Blind (MSB) with a maximum total distribution of \$10 million of the \$20 million total FY 2019 authorization. Each LEA's allocation is a combination of their calculated distribution of \$5 million based on their proportional total enrollment as of September 17, 2017 and their calculated distribution of \$5 million based on their proportional total facility square footage as extracted from the IAC Facility Database.

The IAC delegated authority to approve eligible projects within the total LEA allocation to IAC staff, with a report of project allocations submitted to the IAC at regularly scheduled meetings. Projects are to be accepted and approved on a rolling basis.

A memo was distributed to all LEAs and the Maryland School for the Blind on September 4, 2018 announcing the beginning of the application period and providing direction to access the program procedures and application via our website and to submit applications via SharePoint. The Application Period is from August 31, 2018 to April 1, 2019.

As of November 30, 2018, fifteen applications from five LEAs have been received and approved.

Motion:

To approve Baltimore City HVAC Projects as presented with the state allocations identified, to be funded through the \$15 million for Baltimore City HVAC Improvements included in 2018 SB 186 (2018 Laws of Md, Chap. 9).

Background Information:

The 2018 capital budget bill (SB 186; 2018 Laws of Md, Chap. 9) included a \$15 million appropriation for:

Heating, Ventilaiton, and Air Conditioning Improvements. Provide funds to design, construct, and capital equip heating, ventilation, and air conditioning improvements at Baltimore City public school buildings in accordance with Title 5, Subtitle 3 of the Education Article. Further provided that, notwithstanding any provision of Title 5, Sutbitle 3 of the Education Article or any other provision of law, the allocations made for fiscal 2019 by IAC or any successor to IAC are final and shall not be subject to approval by BPW and shall be deemed approved under Title 5, Subtitle 3 of the Education Article.

At their meeting on August 30, 2018, the IAC waived the applicability of certain COMAR provisions to this appropriation in order to expedite Baltimore City HVAC projects. Specifically, the IAC waived:

- The ineligibility of certain expenditures, including design and planning expenses;
- The ineligibility of expenditures for systemic renovation projects to replace, upgrade, or renovate building systems that have been replaced, upgraded, or renovated within 15 years;
- The requirement that the state share be matched by a local contribution (the State share for Baltimore City HVAC Projects under this allocation will be 100% of the eligible cost);
- Standard local submission dates projects will not adhere to the typical CIP cycle;
- Minimum project costs of at least \$200,000;
- The Maximum State Construction Allocation requirements to allow the allocation to be modified if actual costs exceed preliminary estimates.

At this time Baltimore City has requested three projects, totaling \$2,014,320 in design and construction funding. (see Table 1) These will be the first allocations from the appropriation and will leave a balance of funding of \$12,985,680.

IAC Staff, including representatives from the Maryland State Department of Education, the Maryland Department of Planning, and the Department of General Services, have reviewed the project requests and recommend their approval.

Item VI. A. Site Approval – Prince George's County Public Schools – Glenridge Park Area Middle School #2

Motion:

To approve the acquisition and use by the Prince George's County Board of Education (PGCBOE) of 38.5 acres at 5211 Flintridge Drive, Landover Hills, Maryland, for the construction of the future middle school to serve the Glenridge Park area; adhering to the actions identified in the state clearinghouse review, state identifier MD 201607011-0620.

Background:

The Prince George's County Board of Education (PGCBOE) requests site approval for the Glenridge Park middle school site, located on Flintridge Road in Landover Hills, Maryland.

The tract, known as the Glenridge Park site, is owned by the Prince George's County Maryland-National Capitol Park and Planning Commission, which will convey it to the PGCBOE upon IAC approval. The site was selected from three alternatives after it was determined to be the most suitable for a school. The Board of Education approved the site in May 2016 and State Clearinghouse review was completed in September 2016.

The site will support a 1,200-seat middle school, as one of two middle school sites proposed to serve the Glenridge Park area. Middle school capacity has been a concern in the area due to overcrowding and a sixth-grade realignment project to move that grade from elementary schools to middle schools in the area. The William Wirt Middle School project is also adding capacity to the area, and other middle school projects are under development in the county.

The LEA is using a prototype design that will include a three-room cluster of classrooms for students with severe disabilities. The school is included in the LEA's FY2020 CIP request and site work is expected to begin in summer 2019.

Land Use and Infrastructure

- The site is in the County's Priority Funding Area.
- Current zoning is Reserved Open Space (ROS). Schools are permitted within the zone.
- The school is consistent with the Prince George's County Comprehensive Plan.
- Adjoining uses are residential, school and park. No land uses nearby are incompatible with the school site.
- The site is walkable to Glenridge and Woodridge elementary schools and have the potential for shared field uses.
- The site is currently parkland. No structures are on the site; no demolition is necessary; and the site is not within a designated historic area.
- Existing athletic fields and a play area will remain or be moved to another location. New fields also will be added. However, the site was purchased with state Program Open Space (POS) funds. Land acquired or developed with POS assistance may not be used for any purpose other than public recreation or public open space and is restricted to such uses by covenants in the deed to the property. Prior approval from the Secretaries of the Departments of Natural Resources, Budget and Management, and State Planning is required before any acquisition or development sites may be converted to any other use. For any conversion of land acquired or developed under a State grant from Program Open

Space, the appraised monetary value of the land proposed for acquisition shall be equal to or greater than the appraised monetary value of the land to be converted.

- Shared used of the athletic fields, football, soccer, baseball and softball are likely. Other shared uses are still being considered.
- Access to the site in through small neighborhoods with small streets and on street parking, which may require offsite improvements to roads and lights.
- No public transportation exists nearby.
- Existing sidewalks allow access to the site from the adjoining neighborhoods.
- Fire protection is available adjacent to the site.
- Gas and electric are available.
- Public water and sewer are available.

Environmental and Natural Settings

- The site is not located within a 100-year floodplain.
- There are no tidal or non-tidal wetlands on the site.
- Significant grading will be required, as the site contains steep slopes.
- No waterways are on the site.
- The site is significantly forested.
- No known rare, threatened or endangered species of plant or animals or habitats are known to exist on or near the site.
- Sediment control, stormwater management and forest conservation measures will be required at the site.

Item VI. B. Site Approval – Baltimore County Public Schools – Northeast Area Elementary School #2 at Ridge Road

Motion:

To approve the use by the Baltimore County Board of Education (BCBOE) of 19.22 acres at the northeast corner of Rossville Boulevard and Gum Spring Road in Baltimore County, Maryland, for the construction of a future elementary school to serve the northeast area of Baltimore County, adhering to the actions identified in the state clearinghouse review, state identifier MD 20180329-0203.

Background:

The Baltimore County Board of Education (BCBOE) requests site approval for the Northeast Area elementary school site #2 at Ridge Road, located at the northeast corner of Rossville Boulevard and Gum Spring Road in Baltimore County, Maryland.

The site is comprised of two parcels, Parcels 626 and 704, on Baltimore County Tax Map 82, owned by the Baltimore County Board of Education and Baltimore County, respectively. The new elementary school will be sited on Parcel 626, a 13.54-acre, Board of Education-owned property fronting on Rossville Boulevard, and stormwater management facilities are and will be located on Parcel 704, a 5.68-acre parcel that is owned by Baltimore County and will remain under county ownership as no school construction is proposed to occur on that parcel.

The site will support a 709-seat elementary school, for kindergarten through fifth grade that is anticipated to open for the 2020-21 school year. The project is part of a regional effort that includes the proposed Honeygo Elementary School to provide enrollment relief in northeastern Baltimore County, as the elementary schools in this region are the most overutilized in the county. BCPS intends to revise elementary school catchment areas as these projects are completed.

State Clearinghouse review was completed in May 2018.

Land Use and Infrastructure

- The site is in the County's Priority Funding Area.
- Current zoning is Density Residential (DR) 3.5 (allowing 3.5 residential units per acre). Schools are permitted within the zone.
- The school is consistent with the Baltimore County Comprehensive Plan.
- A portion of the site includes improvements funded with state Program Open Space (POS) funds. BCPS and Baltimore County are working to reclassify a portion of the site to mitigate the infringement on these improvements.
- MTA Route 4 stops at the Community College of Baltimore County on Rossville Boulevard about 0.9 miles from the site.
- Existing sidewalks allow access to the site from the adjoining neighborhoods.
- Fire protection is available adjacent to the site.
- Gas and electric are available and connections will be required.
- Public water and sewer are available adjacent to the site and connections will be required.

Environmental and Natural Settings

- The site is not located within a 100-year floodplain.
- There are no waterways on the site.
- The site is not part of the Chesapeake Bay Critical Area.
- Tidal or non-tidal wetlands are located on a portion of the site.
- The site is completely forested and selective clearing will be needed to construct the school.
- Some grading on site will be required.
- BCPS is confirming that no rare, threatened or endangered species of plant or animals or habitats are known to exist on or near the site.
- Sediment control, stormwater management and forest conservation measures will be required at the site.

Item VI. C. Site Approval – Baltimore County Public Schools – Northeast Area Middle School

Motion:

To approve the use by the Baltimore County Board of Education (BCBOE) of 28.79 acres at the north side of King Avenue between Interstate 95 and Stapleford Road in Baltimore County, Maryland, for the construction of a future middle school to serve the northeast area of Baltimore County; adhering to the actions identified in the state clearinghouse review, state identifier MD 20180329-0204.

Background:

The Baltimore County Board of Education (BCBOE) requests site approval for the Northeast Area Middle School, to be located on the north side of King Avenue between Interstate 95 and Stapleford Road in Baltimore County, Maryland.

The site, known as the Nottingham site, is owned by the Baltimore County Board of Education. The site will support a 1,410-seat middle school that is anticipated to open for the 2020-21 school year. The project is part of a regional effort to support middle school students in the northeast and central planning regions of Baltimore County, especially in the Honeygo/White Marsh area where residential development is creating enrollment growth. It will also serve the Middle River area.

The school will serve sixth through eighth grades and include cooperative use space and outdoor spaces that will be available for use by the county's Department of Recreation and Parks.

The State Clearinghouse review was completed in May 2018.

Land Use and Infrastructure

- The site is in the County's Priority Funding Area.
- Current zoning is Density Residential (DR) 5.5 (allowing 5.5 residential units per acre). Schools are permitted within the zone.
- The school is consistent with the Baltimore County Comprehensive Plan.
- MTA Route 56 stops at the intersection of Franklin Square Drive and King Avenue approximately 0.3 miles from the school. MTA Route 62 stops at the Community College of Baltimore County Essex campus about 0.3 miles from the site.
- King Avenue does not have a shoulder on the school-side of the property.
- BCPS will evaluate the site for potential access and egress lane improvements along King Avenue at the proposed entrance point.
- Sidewalks exist along the Stapleford Road and the south side of King Avenue, but a crosswalk and traffic light may be required when the school is built.
- Fire protection is available from the Middle River Volunteer Fire and Rescue Company.
- Gas service is available in the area.
- Electric service is available on site but may need to be upgraded.
- Public water and sewer are available.
- Utility connections and curb cuts will be installed during the construction process.

Environmental and Natural Settings

- The site is not located within a 100-year floodplain.
- There are no waterways on the site.
- The site is not part of the Chesapeake Bay Critical Area.
- No tidal or non-tidal wetlands are located on the site.
- The site is forested and some clearing will be needed to construct the school.
- Some grading on site will be required.
- BCPS will perform an environmental assessment prior to construction to confirm that no rare, threatened or endangered species of plant or animals or habitats are known to exist on or near the site.
- Sediment control, stormwater management and forest conservation measures will be needed at the site.

Motion:

To approve the acquisition by the Baltimore City Public Schools (BCPSS) of 0.48 acres of land and the associated Crisp Memorial Church property, at 301 East Patapsco Avenue, Baltimore, Maryland, formerly owned by the Chesapeake Foundation for Human Development, Inc., for use by BCPSS as the Maree G Farring Elementary Middle School annex; adhering to the actions identified in the state clearinghouse review, state identifier MD 20180406-0221.

Background Information and Building Data:

Size:6,607 square foot structure, constructed in 1887Acres involved in transaction:0.48 acres

The Baltimore City Public Schools is requesting approval to acquire the Crisp Memorial Church property at 301 East Patapsco Avenue, Baltimore, Maryland, most recently owned and operated by the Chesapeake Foundation for Human Development, Inc., as a space for social service programs. The building and associated property, totaling 0.48 acres, would serve as an annex to the adjacent Maree G Farring Elementary Middle School at 300 Pontiac Avenue in Baltimore.

BCPSS signed a letter of intent to acquire the property from the Chesapeake Foundation for Human Development, Inc., on March 30, 2017 for the purchase price of \$350,000. The purchase was completed in March 2018, and State Clearinghouse review was completed in May 2018.

The LEA's current plan is to use the property for a school annex serving 300 students in kindergarten through second grade, with construction expected to commence in the fall of 2020.

The Maryland Department of Planning toured the site and building in the spring of 2017.

The Maryland Historical Trust holds a perpetual historic preservation easement on the property. The purpose of the easement is to preserve and protect the historic resource in perpetuity. Under the terms of the easement, the Director of the Trust must review and approve any proposed changes, alterations or new construction on the property. The City of Baltimore should closely coordinate with the Trust's Easement Committee regarding any proposed plans for the parcel, to ensure that any work is allowed under the terms of the easement.
