On behalf of the Maryland State Education Association (MSEA), I write to urge the Interagency Commission on School Construction (IAC) to maintain vigilance regarding the protection of existing and newly constructed fine and performing arts spaces in Maryland's public school facilities.

MSEA represents 75,000 educators and school employees who work in Maryland's public schools, teaching and preparing our almost 900,000 students so they can pursue their dreams. MSEA also represents 39 local affiliates in every county across the state of Maryland, and our parent affiliate is the 3-million-member National Education Association (NEA).

Maryland regulations require that each school facility provide classroom space to deliver fine-arts education programs, including art, music, dance, and theater. The regulations establish specified standards depending on whether the school system is elementary, middle, or high school.² MSEA believes it is of the utmost importance that fine and performing arts space is preserved in our public schools for all our students.

As school systems across the country decrease funding and support for fine and performing arts programs, our union will continue to advocate for the preservation of funding and resources for fine and performing arts programs in Maryland's public schools, including preservation of the physical space needed for these programs to flourish. We appreciate the IAC's attention to this issue and urge the IAC to implement the fine arts regulations with fidelity on all public school construction projects.

Dear President Bost,

Thank you for your letter of May 2, 2023 in which you urged the IAC to maintain vigilance regarding the protection of existing and newly constructed fine- and performing-arts spaces in Maryland's public school facilities. I appreciate very much your interest in and focus on these essential spaces in our public schools. The IAC continues to broadly support fine and performing arts through State funding for the capital maintenance of such spaces in existing school facilities as well as the design and construction of such spaces in renovated and new/replacement school buildings.

As you noted, the Maryland Educational Facilities Sufficiency Standards (COMAR 14.39.07) establish for PK-12 public school facilities a set of minimum standards for fine-arts spaces in elementary, middle, high, and combination schools. These standards are intended to make it easier for LEAs and the State to identify any deficiencies that existing school facilities may have in terms of the fine-arts spaces that are needed to deliver the State-required educational programs and services in the area of fine arts. The IAC conducts a Statewide Facilities Assessment (SFA) in which IAC staff assess all the spaces in one quarter of the schools in the state each year against the Standards. Beginning in fiscal year 2027, it is expected that the IAC will begin allocating capital-improvement grants to projects in schools having the greatest need—i.e., that have the greatest total deficiencies in physical condition and educational sufficiency as measured against the Standards. In that process, any school's deficiencies in fine-arts spaces will add to that school's "need ranking" and will contribute to that school's eligibility for State capital funding.

In addition to these Standards, the IAC adopted in 2018 Gross Area Baselines (GABs) that establish the square footage per student to be used in calculating the State funding participation for projects to create new and renovated school facilities. The GABs include allotments of square footage for not only the fine-arts spaces covered by the Sufficiency Standards but also fine- and performing-arts spaces including kiln areas, musical instrument storage rooms, office space for music teachers, stage and wings spaces in cafeterias or gyms in elementary schools, choral rooms in middle and high schools, dance studios in larger middle schools and in high schools, and performing-arts auditoriums in high schools.

The design, construction, maintenance, and utilization of school facilities are the purview of the local boards of education. Each local board may support its educational programs differently to fit the needs, interests, and

priorities of its communities and electorate. The IAC's support for fine-arts programming as described above is not expected to decrease in any way, even as the Blueprint for Maryland's Future is implemented.

DRAFT Meeting Minutes – May 11, 2023

Call to Order:

Chair Kasemeyer called the video-conference meeting of the Interagency Commission on School Construction to order at 9:01 a.m.

Public Comment:

Joseph Jakuta, Lead Volunteer for the Climate Parents of Prince George's County, requested that the commission adopt regulations in accordance with MD. Education Code Ann. § 5-319 as it was adopted in 2018 through HB1783.

IAC Correspondence:

1. Executive Director Report – [Informational Only]

Alex Donahue, IAC Executive Director, commented on the historic increase in funding for the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) being the largest in the last ten years and the impact this will have on school environments.

Mr. Donahue provided updates on several initiatives that the IAC is undertaking. In the months of May and June, the IAC will be meeting with Superintendents and Board leadership from at least nine LEAs to engage in discussions to better understand needs and ability to assist the LEAs. IAC Staff are working with the Department of Budget and Management for assistance with retaining and attracting qualified staff.

2. Consent Agenda - Motion Carried

Upon a motion by Vice-chair Eberhart, seconded by Mr. Darenberg, the IAC voted unanimously to approve the consent agenda.



A. Approval of the April 20, 2023 Minutes

To approve the minutes of the April 20, 2023 Interagency Commission on School Construction Meeting.

B. Contract Awards

C. Approval of Revisions to Previously Approved Contract

To approve the Pass-Through Grant program projects as presented in this item with a total allocation of \$186,173,791 subject to reconciliation and potential adjustment at project closeout.

F. Built to Learn Project Status Report - Informational Only

3. Public School Enrollment Projections – [Informational Only]

Jamie Bridges, IAC Planning Manager, and Al Sundara, Manager of Projections and State Data Center, Maryland Department of Planning (MDP), presented the 10-year enrollment projections for Maryland.

Commission members had several inquiries on the enrollment and functionality of homeschooled students, tracking of migration, and how Maryland's birth rates compare to the national level. Staff explained that homeschooled students are not enrolled in their local education agency (LEA) and are governed by MSDE. Migration is calculated using the birth and kindergarten ratio to observe the immigration and out-migration levels. MDP has compared Maryland's birth rate with the national level and seen similar trends of a decrease of births.

4. Priority Funding Area Waiver - Calvert County Public Schools - Northern Middle School - [Motion Carried]

Gene Shanholtz, IAC Capital Projects Manager, presented Calvert County Public Schools' request for a Priority Funding Area (PFA) waiver. The Northern Middle School project will replace the existing facility, will be located outside of the PFA, and will increase the State Rated Capacity of the school. The project will be co-located with Northern High School whose replacement project received a PFA waiver at the February 23, 2012 IAC meeting.

Upon a motion by Vice-chair Eberhart, seconded by Mr. Darenberg, the IAC voted unanimously to approve the Priority Funding Area (PFA) Waiver Request for the Calvert County Public Schools Northern Middle School (PSC 04.006) Replacement project.

5. Maximum State Allocation Increase Requests - Baltimore City Public Schools - [Motion Carried]

Mr. Shanholtz presented Baltimore City Public Schools' (City Schools) request to increase funding for the FY 2022 Healthy School Facility Fund Cecil Elementary #7 window/door project and the William Paca Elementary School #83 roof replacement project. These projects have seen higher bids due to construction market costs and lead times. Commission members asked when project costs were originally estimated. Staff informed the members that the project estimates were most likely from



2020 or 2021. Funding is locked in when projects are awarded funds but there is a process that allows LEAs to request adjustments.

Upon a motion by Vice-chair Eberhart, seconded by Ms. Lawlah, the IAC voted unanimously to approve increases to the Maximum State Allocations for the Baltimore City Public Schools (City Schools):

- 1. Cecil Elementary School #7 (PSC 30.250) Window/Door project from \$290,400 to \$961,236; and,
- 2. William Paca Elementary School #83 (PSC 30.042) Roof project from \$739,200 to \$1,575,206.

6. FY 2024 100% Capital Improvement Program – [Motion Carried]

Arabia Davis, IAC Funding Programs Manager, presented IAC staff recommendations for 100% of the school construction allocation for the FY 2024 CIP. Staff recommended the approval of approximately \$659 million, including funding for 189 projects and planning approval for 15 projects for the 100% allocation round based on the enacted Capital Budget.

Commission members inquired about the current increase in construction costs and if LEAs may request the IAC to increase their allocation in the future. Staff explained that the IAC is monitoring the trend of construction costs with partner agencies and costs are expected to come down in the coming months. Staff will work with LEAs on a project-by-project basis to address any concerns. Staff work with the LEAs to collect data on costs per square foot to accurately address and fund projects. The current cost per square foot is \$385 without site development and \$458 with site development.

Upon a motion by Mr. Darenberg, seconded by Ms Lawlah, the IAC voted unanimously:

- To approve the Fiscal Year 2024 Capital Improvement Program as presented in the total amount of \$663,928,487, including \$658,894,758 for allocation to funding requests, \$500,000 for Department of General Services (DGS) design consultant fees, and reserving \$4,082,129 in new authorization for design/planning services and unanticipated project costs; and
- 2. To authorize the IAC staff to make minor adjustments to allocations based on calculation of the project's net state funding amount to avoid the over or under funding of a project.

7. FY 2022 Healthy School Facility Fund Extension Requests - [Motion Carried]

Mr. Shanholtz presented requested deadline extensions for the FY 2022 Healthy School Facility Fund program due to an increase in bid costs, reduced availability of contractors, and extended lead times. The extensions will assist in accommodating current market conditions and provide sufficient time to complete projects. IAC staff held discussions with each LEA and confirmed their ability to complete the projects by the new deadline.

Upon a motion by Mr. Darenberg, seconded by Mr. League, the IAC voted unanimously to approve adjustments to the FY 2022 Healthy School Facility Funding project schedule by extending the:

- 1. Encumbrance deadline from June 1, 2023 to December 31, 2023;
- 2. Expenditure deadline from October 3, 2023 to August 31, 2025; and,
- 3. Last day to submit requests for reimbursement from May 1, 2024 to October 31, 2025.



8. Built to Learn Funding Approval - Caroline County Public Schools - North Caroline High School - [Motion Carried]

Melissa Wilfong, Capital Projects Supervisor, presented Caroline County Public Schools' Built to Learn (BTL) funding request for \$4,802,284 for Phase 1 of the roof replacement project at North Caroline High School. Phase 1 will be completed in summer 2023 to replace 103,525 square feet of the 175,000 square foot roof. Phase 2 is anticipated to be requested in the FY 2025 CIP to complete the remaining 71,475 square feet.

Upon a motion by Mr. League, seconded by Vice-chair Eberhart, the IAC voted unanimously to approve the Built to Learn funding request from Caroline County Public Schools for the North Caroline High School (PSC 05.002) roof replacement project totaling \$4,802,284.

9. FY 2023 Capital Improvement Program Amendment - Prince George's County Public Schools - Charles H. Flowers High School - [Motion Carried]

Ms. Davis presented Prince George's County Public Schools' request to amend the FY 2023 CIP Charles H. Flowers HVAC/Roof project by increasing the State allocation by approximately \$4.3 million using the LEA's reserve funds.

Upon a motion by Mr. Darenberg, seconded by Vice-chair Eberhart, the IAC voted to amend the FY 2023 CIP allocation for the Prince George's County Public School's Charles H. Flowers High School HVAC/Roof project by applying \$4,341,179 from the LEA's reserve account.

10. FY 2023 Capital Improvement Program Project Recission – Montgomery County Public Schools – Silver Spring International Middle School – [Motion Carried]

Ms. Davis presented Montgomery County Public Schools' (MCPS) request to rescind planning approval for the FY 2023 CIP Silver Spring International Middle School addition project. MCPS has re-evaluated the project and plans to request funding through the BTL program.

Upon a motion by Vice-chair Eberhart, seconded by Mr. League, the IAC voted six in favor and one abstention to approve the recission of the FY 2023 Capital Improvement Program (CIP) Local Planning approval of the Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS) Silver Spring International Middle School (PSC 15.002) Addition.

11. Policy to Allow the Use of Bond Proceeds for Capital Improvements in Leased Public School Buildings – [Motion Carried]

Mr. Donahue presented a policy to allow for the allocation of State bond proceeds to capital-improvement projects in leased facilities that are not owned by an LEA. The policy would allow the IAC to allocate State bond proceeds to LEAs that meet policy criteria including a minimum 25-year lease duration and, in the case of a facility leased by a charter school operator, a written guarantee by the LEA that granted the charter. The policy would require the LEA to repay a prorated amount of any State allocations if the leased facility ceases to be used for a public school purpose for more than a 24-month period during the 25-year period after project closeout. State bond proceeds may not be used for operating costs.

Commission members had several questions about the criteria of the policy by LEAs and Charter Schools on lease length, location, and program commitment. 25-years duration was chosen based on the lifespan of the capital improvement and return on State investment which is standard to current



funding practices in public schools. The locations of leased facilities will still be reviewed under PFA requirements. The ability of charter schools to commit to a 25-year lease will depend on the school.

Upon a motion by Mr. Darenberg, seconded by Vice-chair Eberhart, the IAC voted unanimously to adopt the policy as set forth in this item and to direct staff to make appropriate changes to the IAC's Administrative Procedures Guides in accordance with this adopted policy.

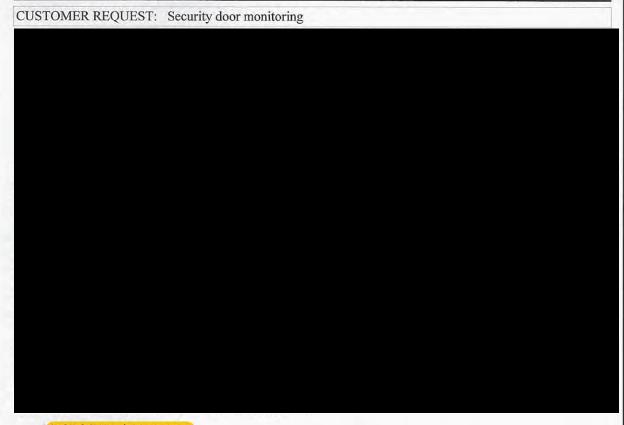

Ed. Art., §5-302 **Establish the IAC** as an **Independent Unit** of State Government

- For greater efficiency, restores IAC's ability to work directly with control agencies for support services:
 - Procurement
 - Human Resources
 - Operating Budget Management
 - Information Technology support
 - Rather than MSDE interfacing on IAC's behalf, IAC will work directly with appropriate control agencies (DBM for HR and finance, DGS for procurement, and DoIT for IT) when IAC requires support.
 - Streamlines IAC processes and and frees up MSDE capacity



Ed. Art., §5-302 Mechanism for Removal of Commission Members

- The Appointing Authority (House Speaker, Senate President, and Governor) now has the ability to remove IAC Commission Members for:
 - Incompetence;
 - Misconduct; or
 - Failure to perform duties.
- The same mechanism is currently in place for other independent units of State Government.



Sunset Clauses for the School Safety **Grant Program** (SSGP) and the **Aging Schools Program (ASP)**

- Sunset clauses were originally established in the Built to Learn Act (sections 7, 8, and 11 of 2020 Md. Laws Ch. 20) for these programs. 2022 Md. Laws Ch. 32 unintentionally removed them.
- The Built to Learn Act provided \$2.2 billion for school construction, and also created, beginning in FY 27, the Nancy K. Kopp Public School Facilities Priority Fund. These programs are planned to be absorbed into the fund, allowing both LEAs and the IAC additional capacity to focus on more holistic facilities and facilities-portfolio improvements.



Ed. Art., §2-303 Superintendent Approvals and Threshold Limits

- The State Superintendent approvals required under Education Article §2-303 and Education Article §4-115 are often prerequisites for IAC approval.
- This language allows the Superintendent to authorize a designee to fulfill these responsibilities, allowing the shift of workload to an appropriate designee with specific facilities-related knowledge.
- Increases cost thresholds for projects that require approval of plans and specifications (\$350,000 to \$1,000,000), and the cost of change orders that require approval (\$25,000 to \$50,000). This is to keep pace with inflation and limit submissions to those of significant scale to affect educational programming, which was the original intent.

Ed. Art., §5-313 **Removal of Obsolete Legacy Language**

Ed. Art., §5-327 **Revisions to LCCA** Requirements

- Education Article §5–313(c)(2) had language that required the Board of Public Works to approve grant awards under the Enrollment Growth and Relocatable Classroom (EGRC) program, but the approval was superseded by other provisions of law. This language will be removed from statute.
- Md. Laws Ch. 32 (2022) required the IAC and MSDE to develop life cycle cost analysis (LCCA) standards. This approval was removed, and instead LEAs are required to do an analysis during the design development phase of a school construction project. This change is more practical in terms of cost and project development.



Ed. Art., §5-325 **Requires LEAs to** conduct LCCA of a 50-year period for construction or major renovation projects

- The IAC along with the MSA was originally required to evaluate life cycle costs of public school buildings over a 50-year period. This requirement is now removed.
- LEAs during the design development phase shall complete evaluation on the cost and efficiency, based on a 50-year period, of using available alternative energy systems compared to a traditional energy system.
- The IAC will submit an annual report to the General Assembly on the number of projects in each LEA that use alternative energy systems.



Altered a number of provisions related to Prince George's County's P3 Agreement

- Removed Prince George's County as a party to the public-private partnership (P3) agreement, leaving only the Prince George's County Board of Education and the contractor.
- Increased the annual State funding to the Prince George's P3 fund to \$27M from \$25M, and moved the funding start up to FY 2024.
- Increase the minimum number of schools to 8 from 6, including one school that needs full replacement due to faulty steel.

Item 4. Maximum State Allocation Revision and Built to Learn Program Funding
Requests - Anne Arundel County Public Schools - Old Mill Middle School South
Replacement

Motion:

To approve Anne Arundel County Public School's requests for the Old Mill Middle School South (PSC 02.133) Replacement project to amend the Maximum State Allocation to include the maintenance incentive of 5% for a revised Maximum State Allocation of \$34,264,000 and to allocate an additional \$3,115,000 of Built to Learn funding for a revised total allocation of \$34,264,000.

Background Information:

In 2022, Education Article, §5-303(k)(3) was amended to require that the IAC increase the State share of a school construction project by 5 percentage points for projects at schools that received a maintenance effectiveness assessment rating of good or superior, or for a school that received a maintenance effectiveness assessment rating of adequate and the school's current Statewide school facility assessment percent of expected useful life is at least 120%.

The Interagency Commission on School Construction received a request from AACPS on March 2, 2023 to amend the funding for the Old Mill Middle South replacement project to include the 5% maintenance incentive. In accordance with Chapter 32, 2022 Laws of Maryland:

... the increases in the State share of a school construction project under § 5-303(k)(3) of the Education Article under Section 1 of this Act... may not apply to any school construction project funded with proceeds from bonds issued prior to April 1, 2022, under the program to be known as the Built to Learn Program...

Upon review of the request and in consultation with the Maryland Stadium Authority, IAC staff found that the bond funds for this project are to be issued after April of 2022, making the project eligible for the maintenance incentive. Further, the most recent maintenance effectiveness assessment for Old Mill Middle South occurred in FY 2022 and received a rating of adequate, while the most current facility assessment percent of expected useful life was 130%.

IAC Staff recommend approval of the request.

Item 5. Maximum State Allocation and Built to Learn Program Funding Increase
Requests - Baltimore County Public Schools - Lansdowne High School
Replacement

Motion:

To approve Baltimore County Public Schools' requests for the Lansdowne High School replacement project to amend the Maximum State Allocation from \$86,589,000 to \$95,476,000, based upon bids received pursuant to COMAR 14.39.02.07C as reflected in the presented project worksheet and to allocate an additional \$8,887,000 of Built to Learn funding for a revised total allocation of \$95,476,000.

Background Information:

The Lansdowne High School (PSC 03.149) replacement project received Built to Learn (BTL) approval totaling \$86,589,000 at the November 18, 2021 IAC Meeting. The project was bid in November 2022 with an anticipated Substantial Completion date of August 2026. The replacement school has a projected design capacity of 1,759 students with a total building area of 318,461GSF.

On March 31, 2023, Baltimore County Public Schools (BCPS) requested an adjustment to the FY 2023 building cost per square foot used to calculate the project's Maximum State Allocation per COMAR 14.39.02.07C.

IAC Staff reviewed the request and detailed justifications for each COMAR requirement in addition to documentation provided by BCPS. IAC staff recommend that the IAC approve the requested project cost increase.

Summary of Baltimore County Public Schools Justifications of the requirements per COMAR 14.39.02.07C (as indicated in the documentation received from Baltimore County Public Schools):

14.39.02.07C(1)(a): Project has critical impact on the LEA's budget.

The Multi-Year Improvement Plan for All Schools (MYIPAS) is a \$2.5 billion, 15-year capital improvement plan. The plan prioritized and grouped projects based on a variety of factors such as overcrowding. The Lansdowne High School replacement project was classified in the group of highest priority out of 7 priority groupings, due to its being one of the Legacy Projects that had previously been approved by the BoE and partially funded by the County Government based on its critical need. Lansdowne High School is the lowest ranked Baltimore County Public School on the MYIPAS Matrix. Completion of this project will provide more space for the overcapacity area while also significantly improving the educational environment for the students. This project needs to be completed before the Managed Growth Projects in the MYIPAS can be started, which provide critical relief to capacity overutilization in many other

areas of Baltimore County. In the intervening years since the schools were assessed, the Managed Growth Project schools have continued to increase in overcrowding.

14.39.02.07C(1)(b): LEA has taken reasonable actions to reduce construction costs.

- Scope management
- Selection of materials to lower the life cycle cost of the building
- Use of bid alternates
- Selected Construction Management firms during design to better manage and optimize construction costs and schedule

14.39.02.07C(1)(c): Construction costs have resulted from exceptional circumstances different from those that confront most projects in the State or region.

The Maximum State Allocation for Lansdowne HS was set at the IAC's FY 2023 cost per square foot of \$358 and approved by the IAC on July 8, 2021. This funding level was representative of market conditions between July 2019-2020 where the annualized inflation was roughly 2%, but was not representative of the higher bid results caused by macro inflationary pressures and dynamics experienced by BCPS from 2021-2022. During the July 8, 2021 meeting, the IAC voted to increase the Maximum State Allocation to 5% higher than the number previously established at the May 29, 2021 meeting due to increased volatility in pricing.

BCPS analyzed the bid results of four BCPS construction projects representing approximately 732,155 GSF. The average building construction cost in the four bids was \$379/GSF excluding site. For more detail, reference the BCPS Bid Result Summary in Exhibit A. Baltimore County's partial bid results represent an 11% increase from the FY 2022 Maximum State Allocation of \$341/GSF, and 6% increase from the FY 2023 maximum allocation of \$358/GSF. Recent industry source estimates and bids on similar projects support the reasonableness of \$473/sf construction costs (inclusive of building and site).

The State Superintendent of Schools has determined that the project meets the eligibility requirements listed in COMAR 14.39.02.07C(2), specifically that, a) the educational impact of the project extends beyond the school and its immediate community and b) there are no alternatives to resolving the educational facility problem that the project addresses, and therefore recommends that this request be approved.

IAC Staff recommend approval of the requests.

In a letter dated March 31, 2023, Baltimore County Public Schools (BCPS) requested an increase to their Fiscal Year 2023 (FY23) Maximum State Allocation for the above referenced project that was originally approved for BTL funding by the Interagency Commission on School Construction (IAC) on November 18, 2021. In accordance with the Built to Learn funding procedures and Section C2 of COMAR 14.39.02.07, the IAC has requested my determination on certain factors that weigh into the IAC approval of a Maximum State Allocation increase for this non-systemic project.

After review by staff of the IAC and the Office of School Facilities (OSF) of the Maryland State Department of Education, BCPS's request was supported by the Designees of the IAC on May 9, 2023. For the reasons stated below, I agree with the OSF's determination of the following:

- (a) The educational impact of the project extends beyond the school and its immediate community. The replacement of Lansdowne High School is the last of BCPS's highest priority Legacy Projects and is obligated to be completed before their high priority Managed Growth Projects can be addressed. Failure to proceed with this project will have a direct impact on the instruction of current and future high school students at this school and at overcrowded high schools in many parts of the county that are projected to have even greater enrollments and over utilization.
- (b) There are no alternatives to resolving the educational facility problem that the project addresses. As shown in the Feasibility Study approved by the Designees in 2020, the Lansdowne High School facility has reached the end of its useful life and lacks adequate air conditioning, necessary safety and security measures, and space for critical educational programs. The replacement project is intended to increase the capacity of the school by an additional 300 students while providing a more efficient, compact layout with better building program placement and educational spaces. A multi-phase renovation/addition project would have taken four additional years to complete at greater construction and life cycle costs.

In accordance with the Built to Learn (BTL) funding procedures and *COMAR 14.39.02.07 Changes to the Maximum State Construction Allocation*, Baltimore County Public Schools (BCPS) is requesting BTL funding approval and an adjustment to the FY23 cost per square foot (SF) for the Lansdowne High School replacement project (PSC. No. 03.149.22). The requested building cost per SF without site work is \$409 and \$473 including site work and is represented by bid results in Exhibit A.

Below are responses to the required elements noted in the BTL funding procedures and COMAR 14.39.02.07.C.1 and 2.

IAC and BTL Funding Procedures

Baltimore County Public Schools is requesting that the Lansdowne High School project be submitted for approval as a BTL project using the attached IAC Form 102.

14.39.02.07.C(1)(a) – Project has critical impact on the LEA's budget.

Baltimore County Government and Baltimore County Public Schools commissioned Cannon Design to develop a Multi-Year Improvement Plan for All Schools (MYIPAS); a \$2.5 billion, 15-year capital improvement plan. The plan prioritized and grouped projects based on a variety of factors such as overcrowding. The Lansdowne High School replacement project was classified in the group of highest priority out of 7 priority groupings, due to its being one of the Legacy Projects that had previously been approved by the Board of Education and partially funded by the County Government based on its critical need. CannonDesign ranked the current Lansdowne High School 35 out of 100 on the Educational Adequacy and Equity key performance indicator Matrix. It is the lowest ranked Baltimore County Public School on the Matrix. Completion of the Lansdowne High School replacement project is a critical component of MYIPAS as it is one of the highest priority Legacy Projects in Baltimore County and will provide more space for the overcapacity area while also significantly improving the educational environment for the students. The Lansdowne High School replacement project is also one of the last schools in the highest priority Legacy Projects and needs to be completed before the next highest priority schools in the MYIPAS can be started. The next highest priority projects are the Managed Growth Projects, which provide relief to the critical degree of capacity overutilization in many other areas of Baltimore County. In the intervening years since the schools were assessed, the schools included in the Managed Growth Projects have continued to increase in overcrowding, resulting in additional urgency in starting this next phase.

14.39.02.07.C.(1)b – LEA has taken reasonable actions to reduce construction costs.

As is typical with all Baltimore County Public Schools' projects, our staff has taken measures to reduce construction costs. These measures have included:

- Use of prototypical designs to reduce fees and optimize first costs and operating expenses through the use of standardization.
- Scope management and optimization.
- MSDE and DGS design and cost reviews and monitoring.
- Selection of qualified and experienced architects, engineers, and construction managers able to bring helpful insights and lessons learned to the table.
- Monitoring the building gross square footage and the acreage of site improvements throughout design.
- Selection of materials and equipment to optimize life cycle costs.
- Use of bid alternates.
- Scheduled and spaced bid opening dates to maximize bidder interest and participation.
- Reconciled progress construction estimating at DD and CD levels to monitor and optimize costs.
- Selected Construction Management firms during design to better manage and optimize construction costs and schedule.
- Initiated bidder outreaches to ensure competitive interest, participation, and also to monitor for bidder concerns that could be adverse to bid outcomes.

14.39.02.07.C(1)c – Construction costs have resulted from exceptional circumstances different from those that confront most projects in the State or region.

Maximum state construction allocation rules are defined in COMAR 14.39.02.06.M. The maximum state construction allocation for Lansdowne High School was set at the FY23 cost per GSF value of \$358 and was approved by the IAC on July 8, 2021. This funding level was representative of market conditions between July 2019 and July 2020 where the annualized inflation was roughly 2%, but was not representative of the higher bid results caused by macro inflationary pressures and dynamics experienced by Baltimore County from 2021-2022. Meeting minutes from the July 8, 2021, IAC meeting highlighted the reality that national and regional building cost indices signaled increased volatility in pricing beyond what economists had predicted, and members expressed their concern of continued pricing pressure on construction costs in the upcoming fiscal year. In response, Executive Director Gorrell explained that the cost per square foot can be adjusted as necessary to meet the needs of the project and that IAC staff would continue to monitor market trends and recommend additional adjustments as necessary. During this meeting, the Commission voted to increase the maximum state allocation higher than the number previously established at the April 29 meeting. The revised number approved in July 2021 was 5% above the FY21 number. Reference Exhibit B, IAC Meeting Minutes dated July 8, 2021, pg. 3, section 5.

Baltimore County Public Schools analyzed the bid results of four BCPS construction projects representing approximately 732,155 GSF. The average building construction cost in the four bids was \$379/GSF excluding site. For more detail, reference the BCPS Bid Result Summary in Exhibit A. Baltimore County's partial bid results represent an 11% increase from the FY22 maximum allocation of \$341/GSF, and 6% increase from the FY23 maximum allocation of \$358/GSF.

The cost increase experienced at the Lansdowne High School replacement project in the fall of 2022 is consistent with data from other industry resources including Engineering News-Record (ENR) and the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) Producer Price Index (PPI) for New School Building Construction. ENR's Building Cost Index (BCI) peaked in April 2022 at 16.1% annual rate of increase, and it was still at a historic high in November 2022 at 9.8%. BLS's PPI for New School Building Construction peaked in September 2022 at 20.2% annual rate of increase and in November 2022 was at 17.7%. Reference Exhibit C for a graph tracking the year-over-year rate of increase of ENR's BCI and BLS's PPI from 2019 to 2022. The graph in Exhibit C shows a clear upward cost trend following the establishment of the FY23 maximum state allocation at the July 8, 2021, IAC meeting. Reference Exhibit D for BLS's PPI for New School Building Construction chart of annual rate of increase, and Exhibit E for ENR Construction Economics from November 21, 2022.

Using the BLS's PPI for New School Building Construction as an industry recognized metric to convert the BCPS bid results for the four construction projects to November 2022 dollars, the average building construction cost escalates to \$426/GSF. Reference Exhibit F for BCPS bid results escalated to November 2022.

ENR's BCI and BLS's PPI are widely used throughout the construction industry to evaluate changes and market conditions for skilled labor projects.

Considerations per 14.39.02.07.C(2) - The State Superintendent of Schools determines that:

14.39.02.07.C(2)a – The educational impact of the project extends beyond the school and its immediate community.

The Lansdowne High School replacement project is one of the last schools in the highest priority Legacy Projects and needs to be completed before the high priority Managed Growth Projects, which provide relief to the critical degree of capacity overutilization in many other areas of Baltimore County. In the intervening years since the schools were assessed, the schools included in the Managed Growth Projects have continued to increase in overcrowding resulting in additional urgency in starting this next phase.

14.39.02.07.c(2)b — There are no alternatives to resolving the educational facility problem that the project addresses.

The current Lansdowne High School has reached the end of its useful life at sixty plus years old and is a deteriorating facility with insufficient ADA access, inadequate air conditioning, and severely lacking in safety and security measures and educational programs. The proposed school is intended to increase state rated capacity to 1,759, which is an additional 300 seats. Failure to proceed with this project will have a direct impact on the instruction of current and future high school students. The feasibility studies on Lansdowne High School and the surrounding schools determined that there are no alternatives to resolving the educational problems that this project addresses.

Staff members from Baltimore County Public Schools are available to work with members of the IAC staff to proceed with this project using the requested cost per square foot. The Lansdowne High School replacement project was submitted as a BTL project in the FY24 CIP. A copy of the IAC Form 102 using the adjusted building only cost per square foot of \$409 is attached for IAC approval.

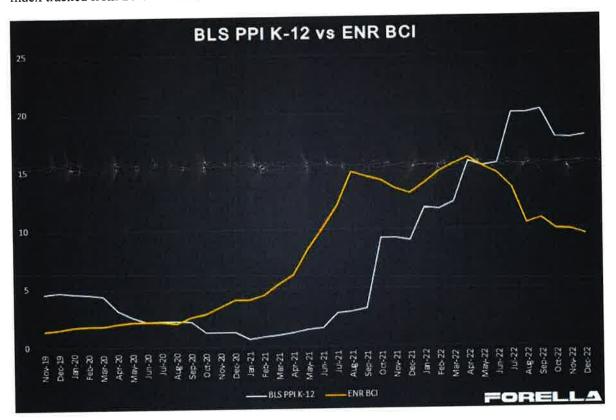
5. Revised FY 2023 State Cost per Square Foot for School Construction – [Motion Carried]
Wanda explained that on April 29, 2021 the IAC approved increasing the Statewide cost per square foot for school construction by 3.5% to \$353 per sf for building only. Since the IAC's approval, a review of national and regional building cost indices suggest increased volatility in pricing beyond what economists had predicted. As such, IAC staff recommend that the IAC revise the FY 2023 cost per square foot increase of 5% over the FY 2022 figure for a school construction cost of \$358 per square foot for building only. In response to questions from the Commission, Executive Director Gorrell explained that the cost per square foot can be adjusted as necessary to meet the needs of the project. IAC staff will continue to monitor market trends and recommend additional adjustments as necessary.

Upon a motion from Mr. Gibbons and a second by Secretary Churchill, the IAC voted unanimously to approve the revision of the FY 2023 Statewide per-square-foot (sf) school construction costs to \$358 per sf for building only (from \$353) and to \$426 per sf for building with site-development work (from \$421).

Item 6. FY 2023 Capital Improvement Program Rescission and Built to Learn Program Funding Request - Montgomery County Public Schools - Parkland Middle School Addition

Motion:

- To approve rescission of \$367,000 allocated to the Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS) Parkland Middle School (PSC 15.212) addition project in the FY 2023 Capital Improvement Program and transfer of the rescinded funds to the LEA's reserve account; and
- 2. To approve a Built to Learn Program allocation of \$6,693,000 to MCPS for the addition project of 27,510 gross square feet at Parkland Middle School.

Background Information:

The Built to Learn (BTL) Act of 2020 became effective February 12, 2021. The Act authorizes the Maryland Stadium Authority (MSA) to sell revenue bonds to fund up to \$2.2 billion in school construction projects approved on a rolling basis by the IAC. Currently, based upon information from MSA, the IAC will base its approval on total estimated available funding of \$1.7 billion until such time as the final available amount can be determined based upon available debt service payments to support the bonds.

On May 2, 2023, IAC staff received a request from MCPS to rescind FY 2023 CIP State funding for the Parkland Middle Addition; funding the project through the Built to Learn Program will maximize the LEA's ability to secure additional funding because the LEA's State Share of 50% entitles the project to receive additional funding that is up to 150% above the Gross Area Baseline.

The Parkland Middle School Addition consists of a 27,510 square foot classroom addition to increase their total school capacity. The Maximum State Allocation for the project is \$6,693,000 and Montgomery County Public Schools is requesting approval of Built to Learn Act funding for the full amount. Based upon current estimates, MCPS is expected to receive a total BTL allocation of \$357 million and the allocation to date totals \$207,716,500.

IAC staff recommends approval of the request.

Item 7. Built to Learn Program Funding Increases - Montgomery County Public Schools - Neelsville Middle School and Woodward High School

Motion:

- 1. To increase the Maximum State Allocation and Built to Learn (BTL) program funding for the Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS) Neelsville Middle School (PSC 15.136) replacement project by \$5,210,000 from \$27,362,000 for a total revised allocation of \$32,572,000; and,
- 2. To increase the Maximum State Allocation and BTL program funding for the MCPS Woodward High School (PSC 15.125) replacement project by \$49,690,000 from \$28,907,000 for a revised total allocation of \$78,597,000.

Background Information:

The Built to Learn (BTL) Act of 2020 became effective February 12, 2021. The Act authorizes the Maryland Stadium Authority (MSA) to sell revenue bonds to fund up to \$2.2 billion in school construction projects approved on a rolling basis by the IAC. Currently, based upon information from MSA, the IAC will base its approval on total estimated available funding of \$1.7 billion until such time as the final available amount can be determined based upon available debt service payments to support the bonds.

Montgomery County Public School's initial request for Built to Learn Act funding for the Neelsville Middle School replacement was \$27,362,000 which was below their potential eligible Maximum State Allocation of \$32,572,000. They are requesting an additional \$5,210,000 to supplement the project and bring their total allocation to \$32,572,000.

Due to the phased design and construction of the Woodward High School replacement project, an initial allocation of \$28,907,000 was approved prior to establishing a total Maximum State Allocation. Phase 1 of the project is currently under construction and design for Phase 2 is underway, therefore a Maximum State Allocation can be determined and has been set at \$78,597,000. Montgomery County Public Schools is requesting an additional \$49,690,000 to bring their total allocation to \$78,597,000.

Item 9. FY 2024 Capital Improvement Program Amendment - Frederick County Public Schools - Brunswick Middle School Roof

Motion:

To approve an amendment to the Fiscal Year 2024 Capital Improvement Program (CIP) allocation for the Frederick County Public Schools (FCPS) Brunswick Middle School (PSC 10.055) Roof project to increase funds by \$38,000 from the FCPS Reserve Account, thereby increasing the State Share from \$494,000 to \$532,000.

Background Information:

The IAC approved partial funding of the FY 2024 CIP Roof Replacement Project at Brunswick Middle School at the May 11, 2023 IAC Meeting. Given the availability of Enrollment Growth and Relocatable Classroom funding, the LEA has requested that the FY 2024 CIP be modified to amend the allocation to fully fund this project.



Item 10. FY 2024 Capital Improvement Program Amendment - St. Mary's County Public Schools - Chopticon High School Renovation

Motion:

To approve an amendment to the Fiscal Year 2024 Capital Improvement Program (CIP) to include Local Planning (LP) approval for the Chopticon High School limited renovation project.

Background Information:

Based upon receipt of project related information from St. Mary's County Public Schools for the limited renovation project at Chopticon High School (PSC 18.019) and subsequent IAC Staff review, staff determined that the information provided by the LEA sufficiently satisfied all the requirements for approval of LP.



Item 11. FY 2022 Healthy School Facility Fund Project Cancellations

Motion:

To approve the rescission of three FY 2022 Healthy School Facility Fund projects as presented totaling \$1,277,155 and transfer of the funds to the Statewide HSFF Reserve Account. These funds will be combined with funding available for the FY 2024 HSFF Program.

Background Information:

IAC staff consulted with Allegany County Public Schools (ACPS), Frederick County Public Schools (FCPS), and the Maryland School for the Blind (MSB) and determined that the projects presented in Table 1 will not meet the encumbrance deadline. Allegany County Public Schools (ACPS) is no longer moving forward with the replacement of the domestic water supply piping and insulation project at Beall Elementary as they have replaced numerous plumbing fixtures at this facility over the past two years to address elevated lead levels with local funds. The Thurmont Elementary roof project in Frederick County was addressed as part of the FY 2023/2024 CIP limited renovation project, and MSB awarded the contract for the roof project at the Knefely building without soliciting for Minority Business Enterprise participation, which makes the project ineligible for State funding.

The unused funds will be transferred to the Statewide HSFF reserve account for distribution to other future eligible projects.

Item 12. FY 2023 Healthy School Facility Fund Project Approvals - Baltimore City Public Schools

Motion:

To approve Baltimore City Public Schools (City Schools) Fiscal Year 2023 Healthy School Facility Fund (HSFF) project allocations as presented totaling \$20,000,000 of funds provided through the FY 2023 American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) for Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning projects.

Background Information:

Funding through the HSFF program is distributed to projects that improve the environmental health of public school facilities in Maryland. In accordance with Education Article §5-322(a)(1)(iii) and (k)(4), City Schools is mandated to receive at least 50% of the FY 2023 HSFF appropriation which is \$90 million and equals \$45 million in funding for City Schools.

To date, the IAC has allocated approximately \$25 million in new authorization to City Schools and \$20 million in Federal ARPA funds remain available. The FY 2023 ARPA stipulates that funding be used to address Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning projects. Funding distributed through ARPA requires that federal reporting and contract cost thresholds are met.

Item 13. Pass-Through Grant Funding Approval - Kent County - Kent County High School

Motion:

To accept a late application from Kent County and to apply \$18,459 from the Pass-Through Grant program (PTG) for the Kent County High School Stadium Lighting project, subject to reconciliation and potential adjustment at project closeout.

Background Information:

2022 Md. Laws, Ch. 344 (SB 291) appropriated \$237 million to be distributed to specified Local Education Agencies (LEAs) for school construction projects selected by each County. These Pass-Through Grant (PTG) funds are statutorily required to be allocated as block grants to the LEAs with minimal oversight by the IAC.

The IAC approved the PTG Administrative Procedures Guide on June 8, 2022 and subsequent revisions on August 11, 2022. To be eligible, projects must be selected by the County Government. The funds cannot be used to replace the local share of projects that have received funding from other IAC programs but may be combined with other State funded projects so long as the appropriate local match requirements are met. The IAC will complete project reconciliation and close out and if the local match requirement has not been met, the State may require a refund. PTG funds are provided without the requirement of a local match in accordance with the budget bill.

IAC staff have presented projects to the IAC for approval on a rolling basis with funds required to be allocated within FY 2023. PTG applications require authorization by a LEA representative and County Government representative. IAC staff have reviewed and recommended approval to fund the Kent County High School Stadium Lighting project. The Procedures adopted by the IAC for the program required submission of applications before May 1, 2023. IAC staff received Kent County's application for funding May 10, 2023.
